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LOCAL RECORD

Her voice is rounded, her gestures perfect, her presence pleasing and her expression indelible. She made a new thing out of Darius Green and his Flying Machine, astonishing the audience, and whether in the pathetic or in comedy was master of the situation. Interspersed through the program was a quartet by Messrs Hart, Fortmiller, Aubrey and Lee, a nicely rendered vocal solo by Miss Rose Trumbull, a vocal duet, heard with pleasure, by Mrs. C. O. Lee and Mr. C. H. Hart, a piano solo by Miss Mildred Barnester, showing a nice touch, a piano solo by Prof. E. G. Lorillard, enthusiastically encored, and one of Mr. C. H. Hart's popular vocal solos with guitar accompaniment.

A LIVE 1890.—Albany was surpassed last year by Chicago in the number of real estate sales, their aggregate being \$102,406,757. We admit that the figures are about one hundred times more than those of Albany for the same period; but let us see, Chicago is about two hundred times as large, counting its population at a million, so our record is the best. The present outlook for the coming year is good; but we predict the experience will surpass the outlook. Many enterprises are in the shell that will soon hatch into live realities. New blocks, new residences, new factories; and as well we are growing towards a wholesale city, in fact are becoming the distributing point of Western Oregon. Albany promises to become the center of operation for large mining interests, in gold, silver, coal, etc., and its possibilities are unlimited.

A WARNING.—On Monday evening last says the Wilbur Washington Register, Florence O'Farrell, who lives three miles north of Hay-Stack Rock, fell dead of paralysis of the heart whilst engaged in writing a letter to his wife. Deceased had only lived in Douglas county about four months, having previously resided in San Francisco.
