**GOVERNOR PENNOYER.**

Some republican newspaper says that the unanimity with which democratic papers in the state urge the renomination of Governor Pennoyer partakes of the nature of man worship. From what we have observed, there is no less man worship than ever attended the nomination of any man for that office. It is his fitness in the most comprehensive sense to perform faithfully and well all the duties of the office that inspires this almost unanimous demand from democratic papers and democratic voters, (as well as many republican voters,) for his renomination. While the Governor is not a man remarkable ability, he has proven himself to be abundantly provided with just those qualities that are necessary to administer the affairs of state according to the best interests of all concerned. He is not, neither in his nature could he be, the tool of any clique, clan, or corporation. He is fearless and courageous in the discharge of every duty. As was shown in the case of the Portland water bill, he would never consent to sacrifice the public weal for the benefit of a locality, even though his own personal and pecuniary interests were closely interwoven with the interests of the locality in question. That bill was one that would test the official integrity and fearlessness of any man. It was a dangerous precedent to establish. The Governor saw the danger. The demand came from a city that gave him a large majority when he was elected, though largely adverse to him in party politics. Every consideration, other than that of public duty, called upon him for an approval of the bill. Duty to the whole state demanded its veto. Did the Governor halt long at all between two opinions? He sought to find his duty to the commonwealth, and, finding it, performed that duty with iron courage and under threatening protests from hundreds of those who had assisted in promoting him to the executive chair. It is a matter of no little consequence to have a man of stern courage at the helm of state. There is no term of that office during which one or more occasions do not arise that demand brave and fearless consideration. The people of all classes, and especially those who are not connected with, or dependent upon large moneyed corporations, have observed these admirable qualities in the Governor, and in case he should be renominated, many a republican of the kind described would cast a ballot to retain him in the executive chair.

A small forest of fossil trees has just been discovered at the Tranent Colliery in the Lothians, Scotland. Several of the trees have been examined, and are found in some instances to be composed of light or dark freestone. In one instance the freestone consists of alternate layers about fifteen inches in diameter, and two feet in height, with strong, wide-spreading roots at its base. Between thirty and forty trees have been laid bare at Tranent. They were said to be not unlike the calamities found in some mines.

The farmers of Marion county have taken a stand against the election of D P Thompson, C C Beckman or Ex governor Moody, as shown by a resolution passed by Pomona Grange favoring the election of an agriculturist or mechanic.

The snow storm at La Grande and along the Blue mountains was said to equal a Dakota blizzard the snow piling up in drifts from five to fifteen feet deep.

It is said that four fifths of the range stock in Nevada will perish from freezing or hunger.

Stock in Gilliam county is said to be dying for want of food.
