AN INGENIOUS PLAN.

The Doy Goods Economist has issued in circular form from photographic copies of a circular and "memorial to congress in behalf of wool growers and wool manufacturers." The circular, which is a New England production, declares that "the fact of the unprecedented depression of American woolen manufacturing establishments is undeniable," and the memorial asserts that it is "a fallacy which vitiates all reasoning to assume that this country can grow all its own wool."

It is argued that under our tariff on wools European mills can buy desirable wools below real value because the tariff puts American bidders at a disadvantage in competition; that American mills for the same reason pay more than its real value for much necessary foreign wool, and that American woolen manufacturers are so weakened by these conditions as to be unable to pay good prices for domestic wools.

The remedy proposed is creditable to New England ingenuity. It is "a uniform ad valorem duty on the wool" and a double duty ad valorem and specific on the cloth. The memorial takes strong grounds against specific duties on wool, and the memorialists are therefore constrained to speak of the specific duty they want for themselves as "a square yard duty." Leaving out their technicalities, and stating their demands plainly, it is for lower duties on wool, so arranged as to fall when wool falls in price, and higher duties on wools, so adjusted as to resist the influence of cheaper prices abroad.

With all its ingenuity, this will never do. When a change is made in the wool schedule, it must be cut for cut on wool and wools; as long as there is a high tax on wools the Western farmer has a right to demand a high tax on wool—and if it closes down, all the woolen mills in New England, so much the worse for New England protection. This country, as the St. Louis Republic pointedly remarks, has been inoculated by the republican party with virus of mutual repine, and as long as the woolen manufacturer demands law to enable him to pick the pockets of the home market, he must consent to have his own pocket picked for the benefit of the republican party.

The duty on wools must come down when the duty on wool comes down. If the tax on wools is put up, that on wool must go up also, or the whole republican system of "reciprocal protection" will be dislocated.—East Oregonian.

When the democrats were in the majority in the lower house of congress, Speaker Reed held the following as his views as to what constitutes a quorum to do business in that body: "The constitutional idea of a quorum is not the physical presence of a majority of the house, but a majority of the members present and participating in the business of the house." His views now as expressed the other day in making a decision from the chair is just the same as the above with the little word *not* left out, which makes his views just the exact opposite of what they are now. The democrats were in power then and out now, but they endorsed Reed's views then and have not changed, while he has changed simply because the exigencies surrounding his party demand it and for no other reason. In the near future this decision will come home to roost.
