THE REPUBLICANS ARE GETTING FOUND OUT.

In the next six months of Congressional activity, the verdict upon which will be pronounced in November next and will be a forecast of a more general verdict that will be rendered in November 1892, the Democratic party will gain by comparison with every act of the Republicans in the White House, the Senate and House of Representatives. Whatever the politicians may imagine the great mass of the people of this country in the long run want their local governments to protect their persons and property, and will not tolerate the assumption by the political authorities way off in Washington of the functions that properly belong to the town meeting, the County Board and the State Legislature. No matter how loudly interested individuals may talk the other way, the sober second thought of the people of the United States is in favor of the lowest taxation that will provide the government economically administered, with sufficient money. The people of the United States do not want their district schools and their local elections managed in Washington; they are ready for home rule first, last and all the time, and no officers of money will divert many of them for any considerable time from this fundamental principle of popular government. The people of the United States will in the long run tolerate only those taxes that are for the good of the whole community, and they are rapidly finding out that a Republican tariff system is for the good of certain classes. The farmers are finding out that they are burdened for the sake of manufacturers, while the manufacturers are fast finding out that they are heavily taxed for the benefit of the men who own the mines and forests, from which their materials come and the manufacturers of the finest goods, who employ the most men at the best wages, have already found that they are taxed for the benefit of the manufacturers of the cruder forms of merchandise who employ less intelligent laborers and fewer of them and pay them lower wages. The American people discovered several years ago that the subsidizing of steamers was the use of public money for the benefit of the business of private citizens, and for that reason and for the further reason that the subsidy policy did not even secure the indirect benefits promised by its promoters, who were usually its beneficiaries, the American people definitely abandoned the subsidy policy and they will sternly rebuke any effort to revive it.

All these discoveries are discoveries of the worthlessness or the wickedness of Republican projects, and they make the speedy and permanent restoration of the Democratic party, the party of the people, to power again.

GOLDEN WORDS.

Why should not men who are associated together in business study and practice the law of kind words toward each other? Why should not the master speak kindly to his servant? Why should not those who differ in opinion address each other by the use of respectful and kindly words? Why should not those who oppose moral evils temper their language with the law of kindness in the form of utterance? Why should not the minister of the gospel, the doctor and the nurse in the sick room, the buyer and seller, the banker and the merchant, the governor and the governed, the judge on his bench, the warden of a prison, and, indeed, every man and every woman, on all occasions, in all circumstances, and under all provocations, both study and practice the law of kind words in the social intercourse of life, from the cradle to the grave? There is an amazing power for good or evil in words. A large part of human influence is exercised through this channel. What one is in life, how he affects others, and how they feel toward him, depends very greatly upon the use he makes of his tongue. If he goes through life with a lawless and acrid tongue, as the instrument of an equally lawless and acrid heart, hurling epithets right and left at others, blistering the sensibilities of his fellow men by his own vehemence, and disgusting them with his vulgarity he may set it down as a fact that he will make himself a nuisance in the social system. Every body will be afraid of him, and manage as far as possible, to keep clear of him. If on the other hand, he sweetens his own life with kindness of feeling and kindness of words, he will be a pleasant person to meet, to talk with, and be acceptable and agreeable anywhere. Society will find good use for such a person, and will use him to its advantage and his advantage. Kind words are the cheapest, and, at the same time, in practical power for good results, the most potent words that one can use.

THE BLAIR BILL.

Senator Blair tried to get his educational bill before the Senate Tuesday, and wanted a long colored endorsement of it printed in the *Congressional Record*. It is significant that he could not get a second for his proposition, and that the only Senator who wished to hear the memorial read was himself.

More declarations against the bill continue to come in, particularly from the south. The legislature of Arkansas and South Carolina, which at one time favored it, have now instructed their Senators to vote against it. The Superintendent of Public Instruction in Arkansas is against

it as unnecessary, and points to the fact that Arkansas has given more to public education than any state in the Union in proportion to its means. Florida, which at the outset was in favor of the bill, has now declared against it, and its Superintendent of Public Education points out the rapid progress the State has made in educational matters. To vote money from the Federal treasury to the support of the schools would be to relieve the State from responsibility for them and seriously check the efforts it is now making.

A dozen other similar cases might be cited showing how greatly public sentiment on this subject has changed in the South. When Mr. Blair finally gets his bill before Congress as he will, sooner or later, it will be to find that it has lost two thirds its strength during the past year, in consequence of the sectional position the republicans have taken, the discovery of the real purpose of Mr. Blair and others in this bill—to interfere in Southern affairs—the development and progress of the South and the fact that it can now and ought to maintain a good system of public schools.
