DEMOCRATIC PROSPECTS

Congressman Benton McMillin writes as follows to the New York Journal regarding the prospects of democratic success this year:

I believe that the year 1890 will witness one of the greatest triumphs which the democratic party of this country has ever enjoyed. The signs of the times all point that way. Our defeat in 1888 did not discourage the democracy. It left the party as determined as ever to achieve its great objects—economic government and tariff reform.

Perhaps never in the history of the world was a defeated party so full of spirit and courage as was the democratic party after election day in November, 1888, and that spirit and that courage has been increasing. The democratic party is in better shape defeated than the republicans are in success. Rallying for tariff reform and good government generally, we engaged the enemy last fall in Ohio, Iowa and Virginia and emerged victorious from the contest. In Massachusetts the cause of tariff reform has become so formidable that leading republicans admit that the state, barely saved to them last November, will probably go democratic next fall unless their party does something decisive for tariff reform.

How can the republican party be the friend of tariff? Its life blood is now monopoly. Its main supporters will never despoil themselves. It must, from the very nature of its make-up, be the enemy of reform. The country cannot look to it for relief.

In 1890 another election of representatives to congress will take place. I feel confident that a democratic majority will be returned and that a new tariff bill will be passed by the democratic house during the last years of President Harrison's administration which will be such an object lesson for the people that nothing more will be needed upon which to conduct the presidential campaign of 1892. New England is now clamoring for low duties as never before for a quarter of a century. They realize that they must have cheaper materials for manufacture or go down in the conflict.

The "campaign of education" is going on all the time. The people are steadily learning, and the shackles which now curb and confine American commerce and manufactures will soon be thrown off. The principles of Jefferson, which are the vital principles of self-government, were not born to die. Fools may predict democracy's death; knaves will certainly hope for its death; but the predictions of one and wishes of the other will be alike futile to bring about the destruction of Jefferson's faith.

THEY DO NOT LIKE KANSAS.

The negroes who crowded into Topeka, Lawrence and other Kansas towns during the great exodus craze of some ten years ago, are moving out now—they do not like their white neighbors, although the latter are the most stalwart republicans in the Union; and they want to move to a locality where they can live to themselves, far away from the whites. We learn from the New York and Chicago *Tribunes* that there is as great an exodus of negroes from Kansas to-day as there was into that state ten years ago.

A telegram to these papers from Topeka says: "The exodus of negroes has become a craze. From the first ward, the heaviest colored settlement in the city, the negroes departed in such numbers that yesterday pastor of a once flourishing congregation, finding only six members left, turned over the church property to the trustees, and sought work to earn his daily bread. What is true of Topeka is true of Lawrence and every other city in the state."

This is from republican papers which are constantly discussing the spirit of unrest shown among the Southern negroes, and which declare that their desire to emigrate is proof that they are roughly or cruelly treated here. We would like to hear it explained why they are emigrating from Kansas, a state which boasts of the largest republican majority in the Union and which they have been taught to consider a sort of promised land. At the present rate of emigration Kansas promises to be soon emptied of its negroes. It is quite evident that the latter feel that they are not the equals of the whites in Kansas any more than in the South, and are looking for a permanent settlement where they can have absolute equality. They appreciate the fact that they will find it only where there are no whites, and are consequently moving into the Indian Territory, hoping to establish a purely negro colony there. The action of the Kansas negroes justifies all that Senators Morgan and Butler have had to say relative to colored emigration.
