LOCAL RECORD

ANOTHER.—We had intended to stop giving flood items, but here is another from Polk county, and as it speaks of the bottom dropping out of a Salt creek farm, it will, no doubt, be of great interest particularly to office seekers:

Out at Tom Richmond's Salt creek farm is a terrestrial curiosity. During the troublous times, while the water was tumbling and the hillsides sliding, about three acres of his land one night dropped flat down some two feet. Teddy Rowe, who was asleep in his house a few hundred yards away, says that it waked him up, and sounded like rumbling thunder. The ground is still settling some and now varies from two to five feet below its previous level. Maybe some landless Chinaman from the other side of the world has dug through and is taking enough from the bottom of Mr Richmond's place to make a farm of his own.

A BIG PERCENT.—Every Eastern Oregon paper contains a sorry account of the stock prospects there. The Baker City Democrat says: The loss of stock in this state will probably be greater than in any previous winter. The principal loss will be in the south and southeastern portions of the state. There are some very large herds in that section. Lew, Miller & Devine had 60,000 head, Glenn & French, at Stein mountain, 40,000 head; Riley & Harding, at Harney lake, 25,000 head; and there are many other large herds. There are tens of thousands of sheep in the southern part of the state, of which a large percent will be lost. This last cold snap is what has done the business for the poor beasts.

A MAN LOST.—On the 14th of February, Mr Matthew Carothers, son-in-law of John McKinney, who lives about four miles southwest from town, left his home near Waterville, Wash, where he had moved for the purpose of sending his children to school, for his farm. He had left his stock in charge of a man, but thinking the weather too severe for one man to rightfully attend them, he started to assist. He has not been heard from since and it is feared he has perished. Word was sent to his brother who lives near Shedd's, and he left Tuesday to join in the search for Mr Carothers.—Brownsville Times.

BUNTING TO RIDDLES.—Passenger train service on the Oregon & California is now running daily north to Sissons by transferring near Delta, and tri-weekly from Sissons to Glendale, seventy-nine miles north of Ashland. Trains run regularly from Portland south to Riddles. A private stage line is running temporarily between Glendale and Riddles, thirty-nine miles.

The traveler can get through to Portland for \$31.50, which includes local and stage fares.

FINE HORSES.—Messrs Chas Wood and Chas Crandall were in Corvallis Tuesday night on their way from Eugene to McMinnville, having in their care four fine horses. They were Lady Beach, five years old, and known as one of the best animals in the state, having trotted a mile in 2:17 last year; Comamah, a three-year old, and Alteo, a coming two-year old, all of which are of the celebrated Altamont stock. The other was a two-year old, by Oregon Wilks. They are being taken to McMinnville, where they will be driven and put in training for the fall races.—Benton Leader.

ANACORTES.—There is now an immense boom in existence at Anacortes, in the northern part of Washington. It is a proposed great railway terminus, and once before sprang into temporary prominence but nothing came of it. Within the last month about a million dollars worth of property has changed hands there. At present it is principally on paper, but every day the papers have something new about it, and it at least is bound to be heard from as a boom. These are days of speculation, and it is hard to tell what is what from many newspaper articles.

EASTWARD IT GOES.—We read a communication a few days ago from one of the officials of the O. P. railway to a prominent citizen of Harney, in which it was stated the rails would be laid into Harney valley in about eighteen months, says the Harney Press. The officer also stated that he would make a trip over the surveyed route of that road in the spring on townsite business. This letter is direct from headquarters and may be considered as the most authentic news recently obtained in regard to our railroad.
