AWAY FOR NEWS.—An Albany gentleman has handed us the following from an Indiana paper, and as only know of one Tillamook Rock it probably refers to Oregon's. It is at quite interesting to us:

The office of Major Handbury, U. S. Engineer, is to be seen a "dormer" of all weighing sixty-two pounds, which brought up from Tillamook light by McClure, lampist of the district. He reports that a most fearful storm was experienced at the rock recently, and that the waves were thrown up by the force of the waves and fell on the roof of the keeper's house, 110 feet above the level, breaking a hole in the roof. The waves were so high that the water ran down the chimney of the boiler and out through the tubes of the engine. The chimney is about 130 feet above sea level. The spray entered the top of the chimney over the lamp, which is 150 feet above sea level, and in streams to the bottom.

OLD HORSE.—The following from the Ochoeco Review will be of great interest to old residents here, particularly to those who know and most noted horse, is dead. died at T. H. Glaze's stables in this city on February 22. Foaled July 4, 1865, he was twenty-four years old. He was sired by "Flying Bill," Linn county's best 1000-yard horse; his dam was Jimmie's "Teller," also a runner of considerable note in Linn county. He was a Lammox or Pointer, and is almost last of that fleet footed type of horses Oregon's pioneers loved so well. He brought to this county by Uncle Prime in 1871 or 1872, and since that time there has been but few races in this county where one of the contestants was a "Beller," and equally as few where the "Beller" was not an easy winner.

Mr. of Trade of Pendleton, Or.—Gentlemen:—What inducement is there in this city, or locality, for a manufacturer starting a woolen mill. I am on this at looking for a location, and would like to hear from you at once, regarding your privilege and what the citizens would do in the way of subscriptions and taking of stock, for a mill that would employ about 150 hands.

SNAKE STORY.—A great many big snakes come from Pendleton. Here is one that will do away with Eli Perkins coming to Oregon again: In tearing down and removing an old building below town yesterday, the workmen came upon a huge rattlesnake with thirteen rattles. His snakeship was frozen dead to all appearances was dead as a doan, and was handled by several of the men. It was then suggested by one of the men that the snake was not dead, a net was made and the snake placed on a board and deposited near the fire. In less than twenty minutes he became roused up and began to exhibit signs of life, and in a short time used his rattles, and he was dispatched by one of the men.

THEATRICAL.—The people of Albany are soon again to be favored by having them the John S. Lindsay troupe, which will reopen the opera house, as arranged. The building presents an entirely different aspect, nearly \$1000 having been spent in its improvement, and no one could be secured who will do more credit to the opening. John S. Lindsay is a superb actor in his parts. In Ingomar particularly he displays a genius not often equalled. Everybody will want to see Lindsay, but as all the opera house, under new arrangement. Date, not yet fixed; season, about five days.

The prospects of another railroad reaching into this county seems to have stirred the managers of the O. P. to considerable activity.—Ochoeco Review.

That is considerable news to people here, but we rejoice to learn what it is stirring the authorities up, and that Crook county is liable to have a railroad.

NEW ADDITION.—"Wright's addition" to Albany is now on the market and comprises 165 large, level and beautiful building lots. The blocks have eight lots to a block, each lot being 60 by 100 feet. The streets are 60 feet wide, with two avenues, one of 100 feet, the other of 120 feet in width. There will probably be a motor or electric line to this addition for some time. For terms of sale apply to the real estate agent in the city.

A LONG SIDEWALK.—The construction of a sidewalk from the south end of the city street walk to, and through, the new addition will be begun in a few days, an improvement that will be greatly appreciated. It will make a popular place for sunny days and moonlight evenings.

IMMENSE LOSSES.—We get the following stock items out to the Grant County News of last Thursday, and they give an idea of the immense loss of that country:

A letter from Haystack valley dated February 16, conveys the information that snow is eight inches deep in that section. Over 3000 sheep have died already, and prospects for more to die, as the feed is about all gone.

Joseph Robertson, of Drewsey, Harney county, who spent last fall some \$6000 for hay, is losing a fearful lot of stock. A sort of distemper seems to be taking off horses even where they are well fed, many dying fat.

J. G. Chesbro, says: "The storm was the most severe ever experienced in that region. We have between five and six hundred sheep alive out of 3400. Brown Bros. have less than 3000 left out of 9600. McIntosh left his land on the 20th ult., numbering some 2000, to their fate on the desert east of here and went home. They are mostly all dead. Then Jim Mackey lost 1500 out of 4000 and had half left after the storm broke."

CROOK COUNTY.—The people of Crook county can now see some of the benefits they would derive from a railroad running through the country.

Hay is a thing unattainable in this country, and owners of sheep are buying out at one dollar a bushel to feed their sheep. This is pretty expensive feed, but anything is better than letting the poor brutes die.

Two Indians came over from Warm Springs during the first of the week. They say that Indians on the reservation have lost about half their stock.

From the reports of losses of stock which are being received it looks as if the loss in Crook county will not fall short of 50 per cent, though it may not be so great when people come to count their flocks and herds in the spring.—Review.

KRAUSE & KLEIN.—J. R. Krause, a brother of O. E. Krause, arrived yesterday from Troy Grove, Ill. Albert, another brother, will come out within three or four weeks, and the three brothers will be associated in business here. They will open open a boot and shoe store in Brey's new brick, opposite the Statesman office about April 1. The firm of Krause & Klein will dissolve about that date, and "Tony" Klein will be proprietor of the present store of Krause & Klein.—Statesman.
