"THE WISH IS FATHER TO THE THOUGHT."

If there ever was a case in which the force of the above proverb was made to stand out in bold relief it was that of the *Oregonian's* article treating of the respective chances of Ex-President Cleveland and Governor Hill to secure the nomination for the presidency in 1892. That paper says, "our latest reports are that the New York democracy will support Governor Hill for the presidency in 1892 while the south and southwest will support Cleveland." The *Oregonian* has had no report on that subject. To serve its purpose of misrepresentation, or betray its utter ignorance of democratic sentiment it assumes to be true what it calls a report. It says "as between Cleveland and Hill the western democracy would surely prefer Hill. The Pacific Coast democracy are strongly anti-Cleveland." To any man of ordinary intelligence who has kept watch of the trend of public sentiment among democrats in the west and on the Pacific Coast, the above statement makes its author appear simply ridiculous. A very large majority of the democrats of the northwest and the Pacific Coast are now earnestly favorable to Cleveland, re-nomination. The *Oregonian's* statements on this subject show that "the wish is father to the thought." The fact that so many republican papers all over the country are with one accord opening up their batteries on Cleveland show that they believe he will be nominated and that they fear he will be elected.

VICIOUS GROWLS.

As a matter of course, two Portland men are thus far the only candidates prominently mentioned for the governorship. Two Portland men are in the Senate and if that city would have her way, a Portland man would succeed Mr. Hermann. There will be a revolt, some day, against this sort of hogwashness on the part of Portland, and this revolt, if well carried out, will sweep the state. That portion of Oregon which lies outside of the India rubber city limits of Portland has grown so rapidly in population and strength as to be capable of doing effective work for itself in the state conventions. The fight over the governorship is already becoming warm and promises to be a bitter one before long. It may prove to be for the best interests of the party to have the "rural deestricks" combine upon and nominate a good man, without regard to the wishes of Portland. This would give that arrogant city a timely and valuable lesson.—*Columbian* (Rep.)

The *Oregonian*, speaking of the duty on sugar, says: "The taxation of an article of universal consumption is of doubtful policy, any way." This is a "free trade" utterance pure and simple, remarkably refreshing, and frank. Here is the unqualified admission that the tariff duty is a tax. For making this assertion the *Democrat* and other democratic papers are called "free traders" by the republicans. For saying that luxuries, such as whiskey, tobacco, cigars etc. should be taxed instead of articles of universal consumption and use, democrats are called "free traders." The *Oregonian* here gives the whole case away by admitting that the democratic position is right. The "campaign of education," like the never ceasing drops of water is making breaches in the adamantine walls surrounding the protection scheme, and it is only a matter of time when these walls will crumble and decay under the mighty influence of educational processes. People will naturally inquire why articles of universal use, such as salt, lumber, wool, woolen goods, tin, iron, and coal should be taxed while sugar shall go untaxed.

The farmer is the innocent with whom the Protectionists sport. He has been fooled with a mystical home market for nearly a hundred years, and now he is informed that there are farther welcome surprises in store for him. He is to be blessed with a duty on barley, eggs, dressed poultry and nearly all other farm products. His horses are to be protected. Dear old farmer! How glad he will be to know that if any one foolish enough to import farm products which are begging for a market at home the improvident man must pay a duty. And this welcome surprise is to make the farmer hilariously happy when he pays his taxes on his clothes, on his transportation over protected rails, on his dinner can, on his agricultural implements, on his house and barns. A few more such welcome surprises will ruin the American agriculturist beyond redemption.
