TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

The Contract Closed.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 6.—General Traffic Manager Mellen, of the Union Pacific, and Ben Campbell, general freight agent of the Pacific division of the same road, which comprises the Oregon Short Line, spent the entire day in consultation with Fourth Vice President Stubbs and General Traffic Manager Gray, of the Southern Pacific. They finally closed the contract with Frank Upton, of Portland for a monthly steamer each way between Portland and Yokohama and Hong Kong. The terms of the contract between Mr. Upton and the Union Pacific are not known, but the Union Pacific will exclusively enjoy the benefits of the arrangements. The establishment of this new trans Pacific line requires rate adjustments which it is understood the gentlemen mentioned are attending to.

Thirty Lynchers.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., March 12.—The trial of thirty persons arrested for lynching Hans Jacob Oleson on the night of November 24, is now in progress at Whitehall, Wisconsin. Peter Jackson, a well to do farmer, who headed the lynching party, yesterday hanged himself, and four others have confessed. Henry Houser turned state's evidence to-day.

High Waters.

ARKANSAS CITY, Ark., March 12.—It has been raining here for about forty hours and the crevasse in the levee above the city is now about 400 feet wide. People are much alarmed, and some are seeking higher grounds. In the Helena, Ark., district the river continues to rise rapidly. The rise in Arkansas west of Little Rock is unprecedented.

More Fools.

SEATTLE, March 12.—A movement is on foot here to send "Queen Angeline," daughter of Chief "Seattle," for whom this city was named, around the world with George Francis Train. The movement was started yesterday by a number of citizens to raise a purse for the purpose of defraying "Queen Angeline's" expenses, and the sum of \$2300 was raised.

Lottery Bill Dead.

BISMARCK, N. D., March 12.—As anticipated some days ago, a second attempt to adopt the lottery measure was tried to-day. The proposed new bill offered \$50,000 for a franchise and an annual tribute of \$150,000. Its opponents moved to lay it on the table, but the motion was defeated—eleven to eighteen. However, the test vote sealed the fate of the bill, for it developed the fact that in the senate where the measure was considered strongest, the two thirds vote necessary to pass over the governor's veto was not forth coming. The bill met with the same fate in the house.

A Big Deal.

SPOKANE FALLS, March 12.—The largest real estate transaction ever engineered in this city was consummated to-day. It was a sale of almost all the holdings of the Northern Pacific in this city to a syndicate of Spokane Falls and St Paul capitalists. The property comprises 148 acres, and the consideration was \$800,000.
