HINTS TO HOUSEKEEPERS:

A piece of soft soap and starch will take stains out of bed ticking. Spread it on the spots, and when dry scrape it off and wash with a damp sponge.

A few cloves on the pantry shelves will effectually drive away ants.

To purify a room, set a pitcher of water in the apartment, and in a few hours it will have absorbed all the respired gases in the room, the air of which will become purer, but the water utterly filthy. The colder the water, the greater the capacity to absorb these gases. At the ordinary temperature a pail of water will absorb a pint of carbonic acid gas and several pints of ammonia. The capacity is nearly doubled by reducing the water to the temperature of ice.

A small piece of charcoal placed in the pot when boiling cabbage will prevent any disagreeable odor.

Strengthen vinegar by freezing it, and then remove the ice which forms on the surface; the water of the vinegar only freezing.

Hot sunshine will remove scorch. The best liquid for cleaning old brass is a solution of oxalic acid.

Kerosene applied to unused stoves will keep them from rusting.

A damp cloth dipped in common soda will brighten tinware easily.

We do not know of any way in which a carpet injured by smoke can be cleaned. The stain of creosote is as indelible as anything known.

Glaze bottom crust of fruit pies with white of an egg, and they will not be soggy.

When giving the final polish to stoves, before putting away for the summer, mix the blacking with a little kerosene instead of water, to prevent rust.

To remove grease stains from silk hats, use turpentine and then alcohol.

To iron a silk hat: Holding the hat in the left hand, pass a warm iron quickly around, following the lay of the nap.

Poor white paint can be washed with warm water and borax, which does not remove the paint.

Glycerine and lemon juice will whiten the hands.

After careful investigation Dr. James Finlayson reports to the Glasgow Medical Journal: "The infective period for scarlet fever is from seven to eight weeks; measles, three to four weeks; Rotheria (German measles) rather less; mumps varies from two to four weeks, and whooping-cough is usually put down to eight weeks or more."

To clean silk: The garment must be first ripped and brushed. Spread on a flat board an old blanket, covered with an old sheet; then sponge the silk on both sides, rubbing any dirty spots particularly with this mixture, one-half cup of gall, one-half cup of ammonia and one-half pint of tepid soft water. Roll the silk on a stick, an old broom handle will do, being careful that no wrinkles are left in it. Let it dry without ironing. Woolen goods may be treated in the same manner.

All kerosene lamps should be filled in the day time and at a regular hour. They must not be too full; they must be very carefully wiped off. The globes and chimneys should be kept clean and clear. The wicks are best trimmed by simply rubbing off the charred surface. The light is often affected by the holes in the burner becoming clogged. This can be remedied by boiling the burners in a strong solution of washing soda.

ALLISON'S AWAKENING.

It is reported in Washington that Senator Allison has seen a great light and that he begins to understand what is the matter with the republican party in his state.

Accordingly he thinks that, after all, Tariff Reform is necessary, and he is disposed to lead his party in that direction or to embarrass its efforts to travel on the opposite road.

But Senator Allison will find it difficult either to win the Protectionist leaders of his party to his way of thinking or to convince the people of his own sincerity in any change of attitude he may make. He has forfeited popular confidence by his unfaithfulness to his convictions.

He was in favor of Tariff Reform upon conviction of its necessity and justice until the democrats in congress undertook in a small way to effect it. Then he jumped with his party associates to the conclusion that the easiest way to win in a presidential election, was by raising the howl of "Free Trade" as an alarm cry. He abandoned his own convictions, joined actively in the sale of his party to the monopolists, under a pledge to advance protective duties instead of lowering them, and made himself sponsor for the bill with which Tariff Reform was defeated in the senate.

Mr. Allison's sincerity in his newly recovered convictions on this subject will command no confidence at the hands of those former republicans who have revolted against the party and converted Iowa into a democratic state.

As to the republican party leaders, the the Reeds and McKimbers, they know perfectly that retreat is impossible to them, and they will not retreat. They sold their party for "fat" and must deliver the goods.

Waupaca, Wis., claims to be the greatest potato market in the world. It is estimated that last season's crop, raised and marketed within a radius of thirteen miles of the town, was 1,500,000 bushels, of which 600,000 bushels will be shipped from Waupaca.
