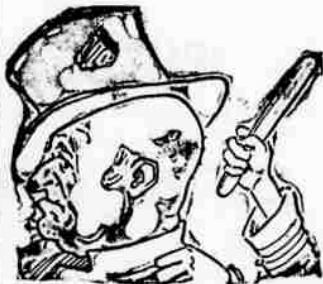

DEMOCRATIC STATE CONVENTION.

The democratic central committee for the
state of Oregon, assembled at Salem on the
19th day of March, 1890, has appointed Port-
land as the place and Thursday, the 24th day
of April, 1890, at the hour of 11 o'clock in the
forenoon, as the time for holding a convention
for the purpose of nominating candidates for
the offices of congressman, governor, judge of
the supreme court, secretary of state, treasurer
superintendent of public instruction, state print-
er, and district officers to be voted for at the
approaching June election, and to transact
such further business as may properly come be-
fore the convention. The representation will
consist of 192 delegates, apportioned among
the several counties of the state as follows:

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

The Crevasse Widening.
VICKSBURG, Miss., March 20.—The
crevasses at Raleigh, La., and Offutt's
Miss., are likely to affect seriously rail-
roads in their respective vicinities. Offutt's
crevasse is now 500 feet wide, and unless
closed very soon the crevasse will flood a
large portion of Washington, Sharkey and
Issaquena counties, the garden of the Yazoo
delta, covering immense area.

Blair Bill Defeated.
WASHINGTON, March 20.—The third read-
ing of the Blair educational bill was defeated
in the senate, by 37 to 31.
The senate proceeded to vote on the third
reading and engrossment of the bill. When
the vote was concluded and it was known it
had resulted against the bill, Blair changed his
vote from aye to no, so as to make a motion to
reconsider. The result was announced, yeas
31, nays 37.

Two Women.
WEST PORK, Conn., March 20.—Annie
Lowery and Mary McDermott, two young
women employed in Lee's cotton factory,
last evening fought a stand-up fight with
bare knuckles in an old building. The
fight was the outcome of a quarrel over a
young man. Neither side had much the
advantage until Miss Lowery landed a
stunning blow on Miss McDermott's nose,
which settled the affair.

Duke Bismarck.
BERLIN, March 20.—A special edition of the
Berliner Anzeiger contains an imperial rescript
cordially thanking Bismarck for his services,
and appointing him Duke of Lauenburg, col-
onel general of cavalry and field marshal, also
appointing Count Herbert Bismarck ad interim
minister of foreign affairs, and General von
Capriivi chancellor and president of the Prus-
sian ministry.

Very Important.
BALTIMORE, March 20.—President Har-
rison and other gentlemen had a fine day's
sport at duck shooting in the vicinity of
Bengles. The president will carry home
several pairs of fowls.

Through Trains.
SAN FRANCISCO, March 20.—Manager Koe-
hler of the Oregon lines of the Southern Pacif-
ic Company's systems, has notified the rail-
road officials of this city that the train which
will leave San Francisco next Monday night
for Portland will go through without change.
Railroad authorities express the opinion that
there will be no more trouble on the Oregon
line this season.

Paid the Fare.
MOBILE, Ala., March 20.—On a Louisville
& Nashville train this afternoon Jake Daniels,
colored, refused to pay his fare, and when the
conductor tried to eject him from the train
Daniels shot him in the breast. The conductor
then fired five shots into the negro and
stabbed him with a pocket knife, killing him.
The conductor was not seriously wounded.

Salem Falls.
SALEM, March 20.—The machinery for
Salem's electric street car line commenced ar-
riving today, and it will not be long before
the line will be completed and cars running.
