**NO SURPLUS.**

The surplus in the treasury has dwindled during one year of republican administration from \$110,000,000 to less than \$40,000,000 and the spoliation of public funds everywhere contemplated by the party in power will not be long in reducing the "vaunted surplus" to a reminiscence. Ex-Speaker Carlisle has made a careful survey of the financial outlook for the *Plain Dealer* which shows the reckless extravagance into which the republican party purposes to plunge the country. Mr. Carlisle detailed the new pension legislation with the enormous expenditures involved which was given to the readers of the *Plain Dealer* some days ago in an interview with Representative Morrill, chairman of the pension committee. Summarized it includes the repeal of the limitation of arrearages act, \$471,000,000; service pension bill, \$144,000,000; the bill to pension ex-prisoners of war at the rate of \$2 per day for each day of imprisonment, \$10,000,000; the dependent pension bill now under discussion in the senate, \$50,000,000; the bill increasing pensions of certain class from \$50 to \$72 per month which has already passed the House, \$400,000. Other pension bills, including one to pension army nurses at the rate of \$25 per month, \$30,000,000. "The bills enumerated," said Mr. Carlisle, "will, if passed, add \$708,000,000 to the \$100,000,000 now expended for pensions. Besides these pension bills there is a bill to refund the direct tax, \$17,000,000; the bill to subsidize owners of South American steamship companies for a period of ten years, \$6,000,000 the first year and \$1,000,000 each year thereafter; a bill which has already been reported to the senate appropriating \$126,000,000 for coast defenses, of which \$21,000,000 are to be expended during the ensuing year, and a bill appropriating \$300,000,000 for the construction of vessels and naval armament. Then there is the Blair educational bill which is on the eve of being passed by the senate, \$77,000,000, and the French spoliation claims, which will certainly be allowed by the present congress and which some estimate as high as \$40,000,000."

"What is the present condition of the national finances?"  
 "Even if there should be no reduction of revenue by a revision of the tariff or the repeal of the tobacco tax, the secretary of the treasury estimates in his official report the total receipts of the government from all sources for the next fiscal year at \$385,000,000, and he estimates the total expenditures already provided by law, including the sinking fund, at \$341,000,000, leaving a surplus of \$44,000,000. But it is already apparent that the appropriations for the ordinary expenses of the government for the next fiscal year will be largely in excess of the secretary's estimate. It has been stated on the floor of the House by republican members of the appropriations committee that \$442,000,000 will be required to meet the regular demands of the government, and if this is correct there will be a deficit of \$27,000,000 instead of a surplus, supposing none of the extravagant appropriations I have mentioned are made."

"Do you think many of them will be passed?"

"Of course it is impossible for me to say what bills will be passed, but they show what a wide range the republican treasury raids are taking, and one thing is certain and the country ought to understand it, they will be passed if the republican party desires to pass them. It controls the senate, the House and the president, and such rules have been formulated that democrats can neither defeat nor delay any measures which the majority may see proper to pass. Pension bills are privileged and can be taken up any day and passed. If repeated pledges made to soldiers and other classes by the republican party are not redeemed at this session it will be simply because the leaders of the party in their inner consciences neither desire nor purpose to redeem them. All obstructions are cleared away and if when this session closes any republican notes have gone to protest it will be because the leaders have deliberately declined to honor them. The time and opportunity have arrived and the republican party must take the whole responsibility for action or nonaction. It is true that the passage of these bills, or any considerable part of them, would make it absolutely necessary to impose additional taxes upon the people, but the republican party knew this just as well when it made its promises to soldiers as it knows it now and therefore it cannot shirk the responsibility on that ground. All through the last campaign the democrats insisted that the redemption of promises made by the republican party would bankrupt the treasury and require a large increase either in taxation or the public debt. The day of reckoning has come."—Cleveland *Plaindealer*.
