THE CAMPAIGN IS OPENED.

The democratic and republican county committees have called county conventions to elect delegates to their respective state conventions and to nominate candidates for county officers. The coming campaign in the county will be a hotly contested one. Republicans claim, that, through the heavy immigration that has come into this county during the last two years, they have virtually wiped out the democratic majority. While this is not true, as a whole, yet there is no disguising the fact that the democratic majority is not as large as heretofore, though with a harmonious convention, and a good ticket we have a safe working majority. But their must be united effort and earnest work in order to win. The record of the democratic party in Linn county during the long twenty six years in which they have had control of county affairs, is one that will strongly recommend the party to the favorable consideration of the voting tax payers. True, there have been some mistakes. This must occur in so long a period of control, however closely affairs may be watched. But, altogether, no county in the state has been so well-administered. At no time in all that period has the tax levy been above seven-tenths, while, during nearly all these years it has ranged from twelve to fifteen. In most other counties the levy has been from fifteen to thirty. We have a sturdy, staid, conservative population throughout the county, who pay their taxes willingly, but they insist that no greater amount of burdensome taxes should be collected from the people than is necessary to meet the just demands of the county government economically and judiciously administered. This has been the shibboleth of the people of the county for the last quarter of a century. The democratic party has responded to this call with scrupulous fidelity. This is not an idle tale, nor is it trumped up merely for campaign use. Without fear of successful dispute, we challenge denial. The party, as a party, has meritoriously gained and held the confidence of the people and are now again before the voters not only with pledges of good conduct in the future, but, as an earnest of what the future will be, they point with pride to their record for the last twenty six years. The people deserved well at the hands of the democratic party of the county, and the democrats present the full fruition of their works and confidently rely upon it as their full justification. For this reason we believe the voters will maintain the party in power.

A GOOD SHOWING.

Since democrats assumed control of the state school fund by the election of Governor Penoyer and G W Webb there has been a most satisfactory increase in that financial branch of state funds.

This irreducible school fund in 1885, including all items, amounted to \$868,735.16: In 1887 to \$1,059,409.01, and in 1889 to \$1,756,709.00.

The earning power of the fund, measured by amount actually loaned and not including certificates of sales of land, was in 1885, \$733,288.62; in 1887, \$781,137.03; in January, 1889, \$1,428,071.14; in December 1889, \$1,568,071.14.

This is the amount of the principal now actually loaned. The revenue from this fund has been distributed in July of each year to the several counties of the state in aid of the common schools.

The amount received by each county is in proportion to the number of children of school age in the county. The following is the distribution for five years past:

This is a remarkable increase in this sacred fund, and shows that it was placed in safe hands by the election of these worthy officials.
