LOCAL RECORD

A BAD RUNAWAY.—This forenoon Mr. William Churchill and son were unloading his large, fine looking team, on the square in front of the Court House, when they became frightened and ran north along Broadalbin street, Mr Churchill on the ground hold of the lines. At the Democrat corner, Mr Churchill slipped on a cross walk and fell under the wheels. The team turned on Second Street, where they left the wagon bed and hind wheels, and ran west, leaving the front wheels in two places and the axle in another. The wagon was literally torn to pieces. The team was stopped near Marshall's livery stable, being only slightly injured. Mr Churchill was taken into Dr. Maston's office, where he was carefully attended to. One of his shoulder bones was broken, Dr Maston setting it, and his body, particularly back, was badly bruised, and the latter strained. Besides these he was injured internally and was spitting blood. After remaining insensible for over an hour he regained his senses; but could hardly see, so greatly were his eyes affected. His condition was reported critical. Arrangements were made to take him to his home in a light conveyance.

SKIPWORTH'S POLICY.—Mr Skipworth, the new clerk of the Supreme Court, went home last night to Eugene, where he will continue to keep his family, believing it not necessary to move here at present at least. After the present term of supreme court there will be nothing except routine work in the office until September and this can be attended to without his continued presence. Miss Gusta Palmer, typewriter during Mr Holmes' term, will continue in the position, and Bailiff Perrine will be always on hand to assist in giving necessary information. Mr Skipworth believes in a liberal policy and will make no changes in or around the office. —Journal.

IN THE DITCH.—Yesterday afternoon several small boys were playing above the bridge on Montgomery street along the Santiam Canal, now full of water. One of them, the five year old son of J N Duncan, slipped and fell in, and was rapidly carried down stream. Mrs Dunc Rankin was passing at that time, and, rushing to the edge of the bridge reached over, grabbed the boy as he floated under the edge of the bridge, and succeeded in pulling him out. As he had only just fallen in he was not even strangled to amount to anything and ran home alone. But for the timely assistance he would undoubtedly have been drowned.

A SURPRISE PARTY.—The local editor of the Democrat was tendered a surprise party at the depot this noon in one of the Pullman's of the overland just in from San Francisco, by meeting several of the neighbors of his childhood days. Banker John Lewis, and daughters Sarah and Dolie, and Lawyer Frank Lewis, wife and daughter, of Lisle, N. HELD.—Caleb Simmons, the man arrested and brought up from Salem for assaulting Bud Cole several months ago, was taken before Justice Humphrey last evening. On waiving examination he was held under \$300 bonds to await the action of the grand jury. He said he would be able to furnish bail.

THE FARMERS' INSTITUTE.

EVENING SESSION.

"Summer Morning on the Farm," was finely rendered by Messrs Lee, Sears, Barrows, Hart and Goss.

Prof W E Yates, of the Corvallis schools, read a paper on the relation of the common schools to agriculture, showing the former to be a stepping stone to a good management of the latter. Instructions in the schools should be somewhat regulated by the surroundings, the courses being according to prevailing occupation. Time spent on algebra is wasted. There should be a national supply of text books, and a close system of graduation between common schools and college.

Prof Grimm was called out. He wanted some scientific instruction in the common schools, and pronounced the present common school system of Oregon a farce. He said a boy who can earn \$50 or \$60 a month in the city is a fool to stay on the farm at \$1 a day.

Prof Yates very properly resented his unequalled for attack on the common schools of Oregon. Prof Grimm probably never heard of the fine diploma received by Prof McElroy from the National Institute for the splendid showing of our schools.

Miss Helen Crawford recited the Milkmaid with great force and fine effect. It was received with applause.

Mr Alex Brandon, in an off-hand manner, gave a talk on county roads that was quite a relief after some of the stiffly read papers of the institute. He correctly said that it was a vital subject, embracing a matter of pleasure and convenience. With over half of the county's money spent for roads we ought to have good ones; but it is not spent as it ought to be. His plan to have better roads would be to wipe out the road districts and supervisors and elect men in each precinct to look after the roads. Now the county's property is shamefully used. The tools are in the rain; not three scrapers are under shed, the plows are in the wet, and, at Halsey, a valuable road worker is resting on the commons. He illustrated, in a graphic manner, the way the roads were worked.

Hon F M Kizer, who has been all over the county, considered our roads in a deplorable condition. He had seen lumber bought to fix culverts lying by the roadside untouched for months. He would plow the road to the center, four or five furrows on the side, and thoroughly drain the sides. All through the county the farmers make a practice of throwing all their rubbish into the roads. He wanted a law to compel men to work the roads. We have good land for road building; was in favor of levying and collecting a road tax.

A piano solo, by Prof Lee, was artistically rendered. Prof Covell read a paper on mechanics for farmers, replete with sensible suggestions. The farmer needs to understand almost all trades, particularly mechanics, and should overcome the shiftless tendency of allowing everything to run down, peculiar to some.

Hon J K Weatherford, down for discussion on the subject, delivered a talk on the Agricultural college, giving some very interesting facts in connection with its surroundings.

A song, by the male club, closed the institute.

Prof. Letcher offered the following resolutions, which were adopted:

Resolved, That the thanks of the institute are due, and hereby extended to the people of Albany and Linn county for their attendance upon and interest in our deliberations, and for the warm and hearty welcome which they have given us.

2nd, To the ladies and gentlemen who so kindly and charmingly entertained us each evening with their recitations and singing, which added so greatly to the pleasure and enjoyment of our session.

3rd, To those who, by the preparations and delivery of papers at its sessions, and by participation in the discussion, have made it the success that it has been.

4th, To those who, in charge of the preliminary arrangements, have contributed both their time and means in preparing such comfortable quarters for the meeting, and securing such large attendance upon its session, and

5th, To the press of Albany and Linn county for the interest which they have taken in our work by scattering the notices of it throughout the country, and for their full and faithful reports of its proceedings, thus extending its usefulness a hundred fold.

The Man About Town has been unable to hunt up a single authentic case of any one who will vote no on the question of bonding the city, to be voted on the 7th instant. Our old citizens are in favor of the move. The capitalists of the city, like William Vance, David Froman, and others, are reported solid for it. Many are in favor of making it at least \$100,000, and that amount could be had to advantage. The conservative element, though, say not to overdo it, and the vote will be on that sum. It is to be hoped a big vote is polled. See that everybody turns out.

Don't misunderstand matters or jump at conclusions. An Eastern man said he was opposed to the city hall part of the bonding business, because he didn't believe in a city owning theaters. A city hall in an Eastern town is a council chamber, theater, and everything else. On having the matter explained he was solid for that part of the program.

The Man About Town is informed that his honor, Justice Humphrey, was greatly astonished this morning to have a barber pay his fine and costs by the presentation of a bank check, which he pronounced the first case of a barber doing that on record in his long experience as justice of the peace. Some one, on the other hand, will say this is the first case on record of a barber having been arrested here.
