LOCAL RECORD

SEVERAL DISTINGUISHED MEN.—The West Shore, just at hand, contains a good picture of Ex-Postmaster C W Roby, who has just vacated the Portland postoffice, after filling it with marked executive ability for four years and four months. A DEMOCRAT man readily recognizes in the pliz his stateroom companion on the "Geo W Elder," arriving in Portland on September 2, 1889. The West Shore says Roby located in Portland in 1882, but there is an error of two years in the figures. Roby had the upper berth, the DEMOCRAT man the lower berth, and a Walla Walla man, who smuggled a nephew through in first-class style on a steerage ticket, the middle berth. Even then, in the tall, pleasant-looking man who was to assume a position in the public schools of Portland, the DEMOCRAT man recognized one who would take care of himself, though on this particular trip he did not display that energy that has since characterized his life. In fact, he spent considerable time in gazing at the deep, green waters that rocked frightfully under the plunging tread of the Elder, and, when night came, and there were about four of them, for the trip was a long one, he invited the DEMOCRAT man to trade berths with him, as, in his condition, he was not ambitious to roost high. Off in the still night the peculiar expectorating sound familiar to the traveler, came from the lower regions of our stateroom. It was a welcome hour when the Columbia was reached and the trip up that beautiful stream began. Among other passengers who are now as distinguished as Roby and the DEMOCRAT man were Prof W S Arnold, of the Willamette University; Mr Henry Farling and daughters, returning home from their European trip, and A L Gray, who left Albany with about \$2000 in coin without leaving his card. These are not very material incidents, but as it is always customary to tell what you know when a man gets his picture in the illustrated journals, the DEMOCRAT comes to hand with what it knows about Roby.

In this connection it may not be out of place to mention a trip while at Astoria made by Prof Arnold and the DEMOCRAT man up the hill now laid off into additions. After ascending some distance and getting a few flowers we gave up the job and returned to the steamer. Now there are additions laid off ten miles beyond this precipice.

TRUE CHARITY.—Some time ago the house, and all its contents, belonging to the Rev. Mr. Howell, pastor of the Congregational church at Hood River, in Wasco county, were consumed by fire, the family narrowly escaping with their lives.
