As it is the vote is so conclusive and unquestionable in its meaning that our Council should have no hesitation in proceeding with the sewer improvements at once, relying on the Legislature to pass the desired amendment to our charter. DEMOCRATIC COUNTY CONVENTION.

A Strong and Winning Ticket Nominated.

The members of the Democratic County Convention met at the court house at 10:30 this forenoon, and were called to order by J. A. Beard, chairman of the Central committee.

T. J. Stiles was elected temporary chairman, C. C. Hackleman, secretary, and T. L. Wallace, assistant secretary.

On motion, the following committees were appointed:

Credentials—J. A. Beard, J. H. Peery and F. M. Jack.

Order of Business—T. J. Black, Sam May, J. O. Writman, A. P. Nye and Geo. De Vane.

Permanent Organization—Oliver Hyde, A. Blevins, Jac. Newman.

After a recess of fifteen minutes the committee on credentials reported delegates entitled to seats substantially as published yesterday.

The report was adopted.

The committee on order of business reported the following:

1. Election of 11 delegates to the state convention.

2. Nomination of 2 candidates for state senators.

3. Nomination of 3 candidates for representatives.

4. Nomination of 1 candidate for county commissioner.

5. Nomination of candidate for clerk.

6. Nomination of candidate for recorder.

7. Nomination of candidate for sheriff.

8. Nomination of candidate for treasurer.

9. Nomination of candidate for assessor.

10. Nomination of candidate for school superintendent.

11. Nomination of candidate for surveyor.

12. Nomination of candidate for coroner.

13. Election of county central committee.

14. That the viva voce mode of voting be adopted in nominating candidates.

The report was adopted, after voting down a motion to amend the report by striking out the provision for viva voce voting.

The committee on permanent organization reported recommending that the temporary officers be made the permanent officers of the convention, which was adopted.

The following delegates to the state convention were then elected:
