NEED ASSISTANCE TOO.—A man writing
from Waterville, in the Big Bend country,
gives the following particulars of the de-
plorable situation there. Mr Willard, who
runs a furniture store here, and several
others, are residents of that country, and
hence the item will be of interest here to
many.

"This winter has been one succession of
snow storms and blizzards. There has
been snow on the ground since the 23d
day of November and it is still covering
the greater portion of Douglas and Okan-
ogan counties, to the depth of eighteen
inches. Stock of all kinds have almost
been wiped out of existence. Full 75 per
cent of the horses have already died, and
the end is not yet. Cattle losses on the
range will go above 95 per cent. There
are scarcely any left for seed.

"Short crops last year and a hard winter
have entailed a great deal of suffering on
the settlers of this country, as many of
them have lost everything they had in the
way of stock, after having fed them all
their winter supplies of flour and potatoes;
and I have known of some instances where
persons fed their straw beds, trying to
save something, while others have carried
feed three or four miles on Norwegian
snow shoes, trying to keep a few head
alive on some bare hill side. Norwegian
snow shoes have been the only means of
travel for nearly three months.

"Waterville and Almdra were without
mail connections for nearly ten weeks, a
distance of 65 miles."

THE FENNIEST.—The following com-
