THE REPUBLICAN STATE TICKET.

The republican state nominations are fairly strong ones, except that for governor. The nomination of D. P. Thompson means a boodle campaign. There is nothing in the candidate to recommend him as a suitable one except his dozen or more banks whose coffers are well filled with those "sinews of war" which have become favorite weapons with republican leaders. In the absence of a meritorious cause or worthy candidates. Dave Thompson is a cool, cunning intriguer, destitute of all qualities of statesmanship or fitness for the office of governor of a staid, honest, conservative people. It has been quite frequently said of late that he has declared his willingness to spend \$100,000, if necessary to secure his election. It remains to be seen whether a whole state can be bought or not. The republican party of this state, (we mean the mass of voters of that party) is now to be put to the severest, crucial test that it has ever been subjected to. Will laboring men, mechanics, farmers, grangers, whose whole interest are adverse to the promotion of the power of boodle in politics, support this boodle man for an office whose sacredness should be so jealously guarded against the invasions of money influence? We think, we know, there are many republican farmers and honest, incorruptible labor people who will not bend the suppliant knee to this boodle Baal whom republican leaders have seen fit to choose as the object of worship and adoration for their followers. No sharper, clear-cut, rasping issue could be joined than will be made up at Portland next week when the democrats shall have nominated that fearless, courageous, incorruptible servant and friend of the great masses of the people for governor, Sylvester Pennoyer. These two candidates are essentially antipodean in all their notions of executive functions and duties. The former depends upon the influence and power of money to boost him into office; the latter depends upon the practical sensible rule that public office is a public trust and should be administered courageously and fearlessly for the benefit of the great body of the people as a means of commanding the respect and support of the people. The republican party, as we have said is put to a crucial test. Will they decide that money shall determine who shall be governor? That party's leaders must be short-sighted. They tried the money power in the Ben Holaday times and it disrupted the party. The election of Dave Thompson by the use of money, (and he can not be elected in any other way,) will disrupt it again.

The question of government control of railroads is again being agitated in some quarters. We do not see how this change would benefit the farmers. It would only open up a new field for political bums to pasture in and grow rich at the expense of the people. As our government affairs are now conducted the roads would be run in the interest of the political party in power. The entire operating force of the roads would change with each administration and as railroading like other pursuits, must be learned, the efficiency of the lines would be greatly crippled by such a course. There is plenty of room for legislation in railroad matters without the government assuming control of them. Such laws as we have are violated every day, and until some means for enforcing them are adopted it is, perhaps, as well to leave the matter as it now stands.

How names grow receives an odd illustration in the Congo country. When our farmers learn to cease exporting only the farm products of unskilled labor, such as wheat, corn, cotton, tobacco and meat, substituting for these, wines, oil, fruit etc., in the raising of which skill as well as labor has its part, their condition will be improved to such an extent that with our natural advantages they will no longer be forced to rate themselves lower than France in the scale of prosperity.

In bottling catchup or pickles, boil the corks, and while hot you can press them into the bottles and when cold they are tightly sealed. Use the tin foil from compressed yeast to cover the corks.

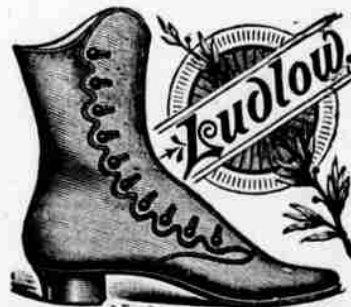
