## LOCAL RECORD

**COMMITTED SUICIDE.**—W G Bradley, who has been with E G Beardsley at this city, committed suicide in the Portland Hotel yesterday by cutting his throat with a razor. Business reverses are given as the cause. He leaves a family at Washington, Indiana. The writer met Bradley daily while in this city. He was a strong, healthy looking man, a lawyer by profession. Nothing in his outward conduct ever indicated anything of this nature.

The Oregonian gives the following version of the affair, which Mr Beardsley, who returned to Albany last evening, pronounces substantially correct: Bradley came to Oregon from Worthington, Ind., in December last and soon secured employment with E G Beardsley, the Albany real estate dealer, for whom he worked until the 1st of March. He came to Portland about ten days ago and took a room at the new hotel. Beardsley came down from Albany Tuesday and had a talk with him. Bradley appeared to be in a despondent frame of mind, as some of his business prospects did not materialize according to calculations. Mr Beardsley cheered him up as much as possible, and made an appointment to meet him the next morning. Bradley retired at 10 o'clock and Mr Beardsley, according to promise, put in an appearance at the hotel yesterday morning at the hour agreed upon. Bradley, however, failed to appear, and Beardsley after waiting a reasonable time inquired for the number of his room. Having been given the number he went to the room and rapped at the door. There was no response. Getting a chair to stand on Beardsley looked through the transom and then saw the cause of his friend's failure to keep the appointment. Bradley lay upon the floor dead. A deep gash was cut across his throat and in his right hand he still retained the death grasp on a bloody razor. As his face was newly shaved and the shaving outfit on the bureau, Bradley must have been seized with the impulse to put an end to his existence just as he had finished his task. It was probably one of those suicidal manias that are developed on the spur of the moment by favorable circumstances and until then an unthought of opportunity.

**THEIR EXPERIENCE.**—Considerable has been said in Albany about Eugene City having a man in Portland who heads immigrants to that city. The following from the Register will give the poetical side of it:

**Turned Traitor.**—It is said the man, Boyd, of Portland, who recently raised a subscription of about \$30 among our citizens to have him use his influence in sending immigrants here, has turned traitor and worked against the town instead of for it. Naturally enough his services are wanted no longer and his salary has stopped.

S A Dawson was placed on the Central Committee from Linn county.

**VERY OLD.**—Mrs Elizabeth H Wells died about 6 o'clock last evening at her home near Philomath, aged 91 years, 11 months and 18 days. Perhaps no lady was better known in Benton county than Grandina Wells and the news of her death will reach many an ear with sorrow. She has been a resident of this county since 1852.—Corvallis Times.

**A BIG SCHEME.**—Considerable excitement has been created by the publication in an Oregon City paper of some grave charges against Col. T I Wallace. The charges are made by H H Barker. He accuses Wallace of fraudulent dealings in connection with his options at Springfield, and some 40,000 acres of timber land on the Mohawk, belonging to the Southern Pacific company. A real estate firm at Portland that is acquainted with Wallace's dealings says his plan was to obtain options on several pieces of land adjoining Springfield, then to bond 40,000 acres of timber land belonging to the Southern Pacific company, and to erect a large saw mill there and build a railroad to it from Springfield. This, he thought, would create a boom and he would be enabled to sell the land on which he had taken options at a large profit. It is said that Wallace expended some \$3000 on his scheme, and had it not been for the backset given to investment enterprise by the flood he would have covered his options and perfected arrangements for developing the property. The colonel is now in Milwaukee, where he has formed a syndicate for building the railroad and saw mill. Being delayed, however, on account of the late and stormy season, he was obliged to ask W H Mills, of the Southern Pacific at San Francisco, to extend his option thirty days. By this time, however, Barker had written to Mills some damaging statements concerning the colonel, and Mills accordingly refused to extend the time on the option. So the Springfield enterprise goes by the board.

Barker, in telling of his trip to San Francisco with Wallace, says that Wallace had no money and traveled around by securing passes on the railroad and jumping his hotel bills. While at San Francisco their passes expired and Wallace wrote to the railroad manager for new ones. Barker says that on their return to Roseburg Col Wallace was out of funds, but he still had a large stock of checks. He therefore appointed a lawyer his secretary and borrowed the needed from him. Wallace is expected back in about two weeks and it is thought his meeting with Barker will be an interesting one.

**HE WAS INSANE.**—Jesse Thus, a miner by occupation, was yesterday committed to the insane asylum for treatment. The patient is fifty-six years old and imagines that his friends are trying to poison him. This is his second attack. He comes from Jacksonville, Oregon, and was brought by Judge Day and F Lay. Thus is an Odd Fellow and has been cared for during a long series of years by the charitable benefit of that order. Thirteen years ago he was paralyzed and when he was taken from his room to be brought to the asylum was the first time he had been outside the yard since his illness. His affliction resulted from having a bank cave on him while mining.—Statesman. Thus received \$10 a week beneficiary from the lodge, receiving about \$6,000 in all.

**BOY STYLE.**—Considerable excitement was caused here last Saturday night by the supposed drowning of two boys about fourteen years of age, sons of F J Crouch and Wm Miller. The boys had been away from home all day, and as they did not return when night came, fears were entertained for their safety and a searching party went out. It was reported that when last seen they were in a boat on the river and it was feared they were drowned, until about 10 o'clock that night, when they returned and said they had been out in the hills rolling down stones.—Eugene Register.

**WILL CELEBRATE.**—Albany Lodge No 4, I O O F, is making extensive preparations to celebrate the seventy-first anniversary of the order on April 26, 1890. There will be a parade and other exercises, commencing at 1 o'clock p m. An oration will be delivered at the opera house at 1:30 p m, by Hon M C George, of Portland. There will be a social at the opera house in the evening. All Odd Fellows and their friends are cordially invited.

Clarkson is the "boy" who can do it.

**WHAT STEVENS SAID.**—Mr Stevens, superintendent of construction on the Oregon Pacific, was in Salem yesterday, and being seen by a Statesman reporter stated that the work of track-laying would be commenced on the eastern extension of the Oregon Pacific in about a month, and then be pushed as rapidly as possible with an extra large force of men through the entire summer. They expect to be able to cross the summit and be a good many miles beyond, in the neighborhood of the Des Moines river, before winter shall again have put a cessation to the work of the railroad. Had this winter been no worse than the one before it men could have worked constantly, but the snow in the mountains brought them to an early stop. In the mountains as far as the track is laid there is two feet of snow on the level, and higher up where only the grade has been completed there is about three feet. It is slow to melt, but the superintendent gives it as his opinion that they can be at work building the track in another month. At this rate it will not be long before this big transcontinental road will be running its cars through to Eastern connection.—Statesman.

**A PROMINENT DEMOCRAT.**—W. H. Dumphy, recently of Aurora, Ill., was in this city a few days ago with Mr Lee, both of the Union Pacific. 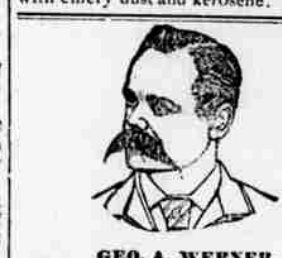
