

HOW HE VIEWS IT.

Henry Charles Lea of Philadelphia, an ardent, leading republican of that city has written an open letter to president Harrison in which he says: "As a Republican by conviction ardently desiring the success of the party so long as it deserves success, let me request you, Mr President, to take a calm survey of the situation and tender to yourself an account of your stewardship. Thirteen months ago you entered upon the duties of the highest office which the world has to bestow; your party was supreme in the control of both house of Congress and of the executive; everything promised a prosperous and useful administration, in which you, by simply adhering to the pledges under which you were elected, might earn another term from the confidence and gratitude of the people. The only cloud upon the political horizon was your acceptance of a Postmaster General at Mr Quay's dictation ostensibly as a reward for certain services performed during the canvass. That cloud, then no larger than a man's hand, has spread till it covers the firmament. Look back now and reflect upon your work. You have sedulously devoted yourself to the distribution of 'patronage' you have turned out nearly forty thousand Democratic office holders, and in this ignoble business you have filled vacancies thus made by giving 'recognition' to the worst elements in the party. You have thus degraded it to the lowest level, till it no longer deserves or enjoys the public confidence, and its interest, as well as that of the nation demands its purification by defeat.

"But it needs no prophet to foretell the result. The elections of last November were a warning that the people would not tolerate your methods. You have refused to heed the lesson, and the elections of next November will emphasize it. The narrow republican majority in the lower house will be swept away, and your path for the latter half of your administration will be a path of thorns. You have rewarded the magnificent majority of 80,000 given to you by Pennsylvania by riveting upon her the chains of Quayism; you need not wonder that disaffection is spreading rapidly throughout her borders in a manner that may render even her allegiance doubtful. The outlook for 1892 is even darker. Were the Presidential election to take place to-morrow there could scarce be doubt of democratic success. Let me counsel you, Mr President, as a friend, to reflect that this has been your work in one short year of misused power.

THOMPSON'S CHINESE RECORD.

D P Thompson has a record on the Chinese question. In 1870 Judge Strahan introduced a preamble in the Oregon State Senate, (See Senate Journal, page 424.) reciting that under the Burlingame treaty "Chinese subjects visiting or residing in the United States shall enjoy the same privileges, immunities and exemptions in respect to travel or residence as may be enjoyed by the citizens or subjects of the most favorable nations," and that "Chinese subjects shall enjoy all privileges of public educational institutions under the control of the government of the United States which are enjoyed in the respective countries by the citizens or subjects of the most favored nations." And further reciting that the "concessions made to Chinese subjects in the treaty were inimical and hostile to the interests of the people of Oregon" and wound up with a resolution asking our senators and representative in congress "to use all honorable means to procure the abrogation of the said treaty." Here was a plain, direct, simple issue on the Chinese question and Dave Thompson took the wrong side of it by voting no. (See page 426 Senate Journal 1870.) Now, then, David is running for governor on an anti-Chinese platform. David is a regular Oily Gammon of a fellow.

The Pittsburg Plate Glass company made a profit of nearly 35 per cent. on its capital of \$2,754,000 during 1889. Plate glass is protected by an ad valorem duty of from 77 to 144 per cent, and the congressional committee on ways and means has agreed to advance the duties on plate and window glass in order that the company's profits may become still larger. In this way the republican party proposes that the money which the Plate Glass Company gave to elect Harrison shall come out of the people's pocket. The rates of duty on "unpolished cylinder, crown and common window glass," of various sizes, are equivalent to the following ad valorem rates: 60.71 per cent., 93.11 per cent., 106.21 per cent, and 108.40 per cent. Taking the two sizes, which are most imported, window glass that cost \$833,749 had to pay the tax to the government and a like ratio to the American manufacturers. And yet the window glass manufacturers are clamoring for more duties.

When this congress adjourns there will be a republican majority of 14 in the senate. So no matter how much majority the democrats may have in the next house they cannot repeal a law or make a change, as the senate will be dead against them. The republicans mean to make hay while the sunshines. By enacting permanent appropriation bills for the navy, coast defenses and steamship subsidies which the democratic house cannot repeal

because of the republican senate, the republicans hope to keep the expense of the government at such a high notch that the necessities of the revenue will prevent a reduction of tariff taxes. This is the reduction plan, and from present appearances it will be executed.

Herman for congressman, Thompson for governor, McBride for secretary of state, Metchan for treasurer, Bean for supreme judge, McElroy for superintendent of schools, and Baker for state printer makes up a ticket that no republican will scratch and many democrats will vote straight. —Telegram.

Now if some fool editor of a democratic paper will give vent to a like amount of chatter and gibberish about the democratic state ticket to be nominated next week we will be able to trot out the two champion liars and braggarts of the commonwealth.
