This item appears in a St. Paul paper, and was evolved from somebody stopping in this country. The Democrat pities the poor man anywhere without means; but he stands as good a chance here as anywhere if he has a little money. The trouble is, a great many who come here imagine that they will be met at the depot with offers of work and have \$20 pieces slung in their faces in advance; but of course this is not the experience. Everything is not high here. Meat and flour, the staples, are cheaper than in the East, and the difference generally, though some, is not very marked. It is a curious kind of a man who can't get along in the Willamette valley, and he deserves to be blown around by cyclones.

JUST LIKE THE WORLD.—A lady was seeking the mayor yesterday for permission to play a little organ on the streets for a few days. Nineteen years ago she was a music teacher in this city. Now she is a widow and sick and poor. She was paralyzed three years ago and her means and her friends are all exhausted. She does not wish to follow this as a business, but wishes to remain in this climate, hoping to hasten her recovery, for she has two young daughters to live for. A reporter learned that the lady's name when she was in Salem was Mrs. Wm. Thatcher, and her name now Mrs. Richardson, although she did not want this published. —Statesman.

MINING MATTERS.—At a miners' meeting in Brownsville, Monday evening, twenty mining claims were pooled and articles of incorporation drawn. The company was organized under the name of "The Calapooia and Blue River Mill and Mining Co.," with a capital stock of \$100,000. The claims that were pooled were selected from all parts of the district and are considered representative claims.

The Trinity Mill and Mining Co. of Brownsville own three valuable claims in the Calapooia district. The Gold Dust is 16 feet wide and assays on the surface between \$10 and \$11, mostly gold. The Zanol is a well defined lead, 6 feet in width, with granite and porphyry walls, and has been located for a distance of two miles. The Jenny Lind, the last of the Trinity group, lies parallel with and at a distance of 100 feet from the Zanol. It is a wide lead, and, like the Zanol, assays well. These mines are owned by J. A. Winter, of Jefferson, A. Jack Adams, of Lebanon; Capt. E. D. Von Hagen, Wm. McLeod and Peter Hume (banker), of Brownsville, and H. V. Goddard, of Portland. The company will make developments on their claims this coming season that will startle the "natives." —Express.

FUN IN BROWNVILLE.—Brownsville has been having a time over the saloon question, and the result is a saloon in their midst before they knew it. A correspondent to an exchange puts it in this light: "The situation in Brownsville in regard to the saloon license is decidedly funny. The prohibition element is very angry over the action of our council, while the devotees of the flowing bowl sip their bug-juice with a complacent smile; and our city dais are scratching their heads in a perplexed way as if they had forgotten something.
