THAT PLATFORM.

Editors Democrat:

"Such is the soul of wit but not belong, To me the arrows of satire song, The royal vices of our age demand A keener weapon and a mightier hand," "The occasion makes the man," it is said, and, it seems the satirist as well. But who could have expected him to appear in the midst of the great republican convention of Oregon. Yet he was there, and the chief scribe in that august assemblage, especially selected because of the force of his sarcasm and the pungency of his wit. Let the reader ponder over this pointed deliverance:

"First, We favor honest, efficient, and economical administration of every department of government both state and national." This was doubtless written out of respect to the memory of the immortal Pickwick and was intended to be understood in a strictly Pickwickian sense. To think otherwise, one must become oblivious of history and all the past, and declare that the present congress and the last legislature of Oregon are myths; that the last Oregon legislature never met at the capital, occupied its spacious halls nor held high carnival there for forty days and nights and squandered the revenues wrung from the people for the basest party purposes, if not for something still worse and more degrading. And congress! that immaculate body of good men! Is it not laboring incessantly to "reduce the surplus" by distributing the accumulated millions in the treasury, wrung from long suffering taxpayers already overburdened with taxes, among its partisans? Oh, yes! For "economical administration" commend us always and under all circumstances to the average republican legislature or a congress composed of the same "honest and efficient" sort of statesmen. And pray what has the republican party ever done for the free school system of the state that it would be "proud?" The careful economy shown in the management of the fund is what builds the system up and makes it enduring. Under Governor Penneyer's administration the fund has grown and accumulated much faster than it ever did under any republican administration. Let the people think! In 1885 the total irreducible school fund of the state was \$868,735.16. In 1889 it has grown to the magnificent sum of \$1,735,709.00 showing an increase under Governor Penneyer's administration of \$867,973.84, thus more than doubling in that brief period. There is a reason for this. Is it because the money was kept constantly at interest and not loaned without interest to favorite partisans to reimburse them for campaign contributions and for "work" for "the party?" Let the people dispassionately cast their eyes over the figures and put this and that together and draw their own conclusions.

"Third, And whereas the republican party has always contended for a pure electoral system" etc. What memories of the "purity" of the republican electoral system rise up to exhort us! A stolen president! Another president elected by debauching the electors with money, avowedly buying them and marching them to the polls in "blocks of five," a commonwealth, the "Gem of the mountains," just emerging into statehood, throttled in her birth by the pure hand of the republican party, and the best part of her present heritage torn from her, and last but not least, thirty five of the very men who in that convention, contend so very stoutly for a pure electoral system obtained their seats in that body by repeating and notorious bribery at the primaries in Portland. This convention scribe never perpetrated a finer stroke of sarcasm. And next come words of praise of Thomas B Reed, that "courageous statesman from Maine." Why? He tore away and sought to obliterate one of the great landmarks of the constitution. Through all administrations for more than a hundred years, this sacred citadel of the minority was never before invaded. In the long line of illustrious men who have occupied the speaker's chair including the greatest lights that ever illuminated our political horizon, no "statesman" was courageous enough to do a deed like that. Perhaps "courage" is found only in these degenerate days of which the illustrious "statesman" from Maine is a bright example. But we grow weary revelling amidst this richness. More must be deferred to a future time.
