LOCAL RECORD

LIVELY SCENE.—A very important matter came before the city council last evening. It was the petition of Mrs. Cheadle to be allowed to move the woodshed in the rear of her lot on First street between Baker and Lyon, forward to the street and repair it, her intention being to make a harness shop of it, the building in fact already being rented for that purpose. As it came within the restrictions of the fire limits ordinance the committee which had had the matter under consideration, reported against it, and the petition was rejected. Mrs. Cheadle was present when the decision was rendered, and asked the privilege to address the council, which was granted. A speech full of characteristic irony secured the council for their ingratitude and in eloquent words narrated her work for Albany. She asked for privileges for the woman, battling alone, and, by stirring invectives told the council they might want favors. Her charge at a member had built on his own premises, without permission, a hen coop (cost \$5) was received with smiles. The council was subdued and no one rose to respond to the rich flow of words which our worthy fellow-citizen has come famous. But the woodshed will remain in the rear of the lot. The council could not doubt like to grant all the privileges possible to Albany's leading property owner; but very properly they propose to enforce the fire ordinance strictly, particularly in reference to business property.

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

Tuesday evening, April 22.
Present—All members and officers.
The following accounts were reported favorably on and ordered paid: J. N. Hoffman, \$14.20; C. W. Watts, printing charter and ordinances, \$163.00; J. M. Bridgeford, \$4.00; W. B. Barr, \$123.00; John Maxwell, \$16.30; S. W. Reese, \$2.00; J. W. Reese, \$2.00; Jas. Laurant, \$45.54; Henry East, \$7.00; W. E. Kelley, \$5.00; G. L. Savage, \$1.00; W. N. Miller, \$70.00; John Jones, \$70.00; W. A. McClain, \$50.00; A. J. Hunt, \$65.00.

The matter of an arc light at the corner of Fifth and Jackson streets was referred. The petition of E. J. O'Connor and one for a cross walk in Third ward was granted.

The committee on streets and public property reported in favor of graveling Ellsworth street, third to Fourth, of a couple crosswalks, and that the city gravel pit in the eastern suburbs be opened for use if without cost to the city.

The application of Mrs. Cheadle for the removal of an old building was rejected. May 6 was set for the meeting of the board of Equalization.

Recommendations for improvements by street commissioner were referred to the committee on streets and public property.

The street commissioner reported that the material for the bridge across the creek adjoining the cannery in East Albany was ready and asked for instructions. He was directed to place the same on grade and notify the adjoining property owners to grade the street within ten days after the completion of the bridge.

The petition of D. R. N. Blackburn asking for an established grade on Calapooia, Third and Washington streets, was read and referred to the council as a committee of the whole, including the city surveyor.

The ordinance on grades, sewers and water pipes was read and passed.

No. 2's suction was reported received and that it worked well.

The new volume of city charter and ordinances was formally considered by the council, and accepted, the work presenting a very commendable appearance.
