NEW CHURCHES.—Among the improvements in Albany this year will be a handsome church edifice at the corner of Washington and Fifth streets, to take the place of the present U. P. church. The old building will be moved to the east end of Sixth street and be used as a mission church; Mrs. Hackleman having donated a lot for that purpose. The cost of this new structure will be about \$10,000 and it is intended to give it all the modern conveniences, so much needed by this church organization, the old building proving entirely inadequate to the demands of the growing congregation, Sabbath school and Y. P. S. C. E.

The M. E. church for the same reason will build a handsome new church at the site of their present church. It will cost about \$7,000 and promises to be one of the prettiest edifices in the valley. Work will be begun about June 1st.

A BOY ARRESTED.—This forenoon Fred McDonald, a fifteen year old youth, was arrested for disorderly conduct, consisting of throwing a rock at the corner of First and of Ellsworth street, which barely missed a man and a woman passing by and coming close to Goetz restaurant window. He was taken before Recorder Henton and fined \$5 and costs, which he will pay by a residence of several days in the calaboose. Several other boys with him were probably as guilty, but did not happen to be caught at it. McDonald is one of the boys who started out to be a tramp several weeks ago, and had it not been a many fold repetition of numerous little offenses, would probably not have been arrested. A number of other boys will get a like punishment if they do not behave themselves. The marshal is watching them and proposes to have order.

JUST FOR DRUNKENNESS.—Captain E. S. Edwards and Mr. F. McDermott, the United States local inspectors, have returned from their business jaunt to Yaquina bay. They went to Newport to investigate the charges of "non-compliance with rules and negligence through drunkenness," which were preferred by an engineer named Sackett against Captain Blake, of the steamer Walluski. The inspectors considered the case to be six of one and half a dozen of the other. They will suspend the license of both the captain and the engineer for sixty days, and will impose a fine of \$2,800 on the steamer. The Walluski, which is worth about \$1,500, is in charge of the collector of customs, who, on the 17th of the present month, tied the steamer up and placed a watchman on board. The boat will not be allowed to be taken away until the fine is liquidated.—Oregonian.

THAT SYSTEM.—Considerable inquiry is made about the famous Australian ballot system in vogue in a number of states. To satisfy the curious we give the principal points of the system:

1. All ballots must be printed and distributed at the public expense.
2. The names of all candidates must be printed on the same ticket.
3. The ballot must be delivered to the voter within the polling place by sworn officers of election.
4. No ballots may be delivered save those delivered.
5. The voter must be guaranteed absolute privacy in preparing his ballot.
6. The secrecy of the ballot must be made compulsory.

A CELEBRATED MAN.—C. P. Huntington and party passed through Albany at 11:30 to-day, stopping for a few moments at the water tank; seemingly taking no notice of the future metropolis of the valley, with her splendid surroundings. Kocher and Brandt's car headed the procession. The distinguished people sat on board and do not seem to pay much attention to the country through which the Southern Pacific passes, of which C. P. Huntington is now president. It is possible that Mr. Huntington will stop off at Albany on his return, but not probable.

A RACE WAR PROBABLE.—Mr. B. F. Blodgett, who lives near town, tells us of an incident that spoils the old adage, "Birds of a feather flock together." One of his domestic fowls and a Mongolian pheasant are laying in the same nest. He is expecting amicable relations to continue between these two fowls until the incubating process begins, when, as in the past, the Chinaman must go.—Express.

A SHUFFLER.—This is an age for relieving the great stress on tired out people. We have been dreaming all kinds of possibilities but never yet of an invention for shuffling cards. Here is the way it works: A sharp turn to the right of either of the two handles places the machine in working order. The cards are then dropped into the slot. The machine works by itself, and the cards gradually disappear. When the whole has passed into the machine the handle is turned again in the same direction, and the cards will be brought back to the surface of the table. Another pack should then be placed in the slot, and the shuffling process repeats itself while the players are dealing and playing pack No. 1.

GETTING POPULAR ALREADY.—The tweeds being manufactured by the Albany woolen mills are already getting a reputation. California wholesalers who saw them pronounced them superior to anything manufactured in that state in the line of tweeds, and the result was \$25,000 in orders from that state alone. This is a fact of great interest to Albany, for the marked success of the woolen mills is a matter of much concern to the city. The mill has work ahead on present orders for four or five months running full force, and more machinery has been ordered.
