HUNTINGTON WILL COME

This forenoon Mr Jay W. Blain received the following telegram in response to one sent to C P Huntington, President of the Southern Pacific, asking him to stop off at Albany and meet the members of the Board of Trade:

Mr Jay W. Blain, Sec'y.—Having left the road at Eugene to go over the Oregonian R R, did not receive your telegram until arrival at Woodburn on way to Portland. If we have time will be pleased to meet the gentlemen of your Board of Trade on our return, of which will advise you later.

C P HUNTINGTON.
It is thought Huntington will return in about ten days. A meeting of the Board of Trade will be held at the Council Chambers, at 7:30 Monday evening, to make arrangements for the reception of Mr Huntington and party. Among other things it is desired to have trains run on the Narrow Gauge, when changed to a standard gauge, directly into Albany, a move that will prove of great advantage to the shipping interests of Brownsville, Coburg and other places, as well as to Albany. Then Albany desires terminal facilities which it will probably secure in time.

Seventy-First Anniversary.

The celebration of the 71st anniversary of Old Fellowship, began in Albany this afternoon. A large number were present from all parts of the county. The procession formed at 1:30 at the O F hall, headed by the Mechanics band, followed by about seventy-five Old Fellows in regalia. Then came the arc of the covenant drawn by a fine span of grays, Mr W E Gillet, representing the patriarch, a back containing Hon M C George, speaker for the occasion, and other Old Fellows closed the procession. After marching through the principal streets they were joined by the W R C and marched to the Opera House where the exercises of the afternoon were opened with music by the band, followed by an ode by the O F's. The chaplain, J F Backensto read a prayer, and Hon M C George delivered the address, an elaborate effort, presented in that spirit for which he has become so well known. Miss Helen Crawford recited "Evelyn Hope," one of Browning's masterpieces. It was heard with pleasure; its presentation displayed force and power, bringing out the speakers full, round voice with fine effect, and conferring great credit on the splendid drilling of her voice and action as displayed in the recitation. An ode closed the afternoon exercises.

The program heretofore published will be presented to-night. Admission 25 cents. Refreshments extra. A large audience will probably be present.

TEMPERANCE COLUMN.

The following we glean from the report of the Supt of S. S. work: In bringing my report of the years' work in this department I regret to say that it is not as full and accurate as I would like to have it, owing to the fact that I find it very difficult to secure reports from those schools who have not thought best to appoint a temperance secretary to further and report the work. It is very encouraging to receive full and cheering reports from the efficient secretaries who have been appointed. We have in our city nine Protestant Sunday schools. The average attendance in eight of these is 550. Four schools reporting quarterly temperance lessons regularly—the others interchange with missionary lessons or quarterly review. One school reports No of pledged scholars, 66. The amount of literature distributed, 4000 pages of leaflets, 150 copies of The Water Lily, a small temperance paper published by Mat Lon security, and 270 copies Young Crusader, 48 pages of temperance lessons, eight temperance sermons and addresses are reported, two of them illustrated by the blackboard. No of teachers members of the W C T U, 26.
