ALBANY WILL VISIT US.—The Salem Statesman heads an item in that style, and then says, on what authority is not known, as some are talking celebration here also: "Albany will not celebrate the Fourth of July this year. She did the grand act last year in a very successful manner and this year she will visit Salem. She has so signified her willingness that was the understanding last year. Now Salem is in duty bound to give a grand celebration, and from present indications she will do so in such an elaborate manner that the many visitors who will be here will go away speaking in the highest praise of Salem's ability regarding such affairs. Let the tidings go forth that Salem will celebrate."

S. S. WORK.—Rev. Holberg, president of the State Sabbath Schools, has been in the city making preliminary arrangements for the organization of a County S. S. society. There are now only three county organizations in the state, and it is proposed to secure at least ten or twelve before the National Convention which meets at Pittsburg, generally attended by 2500 delegates, so as to have a fine showing for Oregon. A meeting will be called in May for the county organization.

EARLY CLOSING.

Editors Democrat:

This early closing movement is causing a good deal of talk, and rightly so, but is it going to end in talk? This remains with our business men to say. I have seen most of the business men in town and all agree it is the right thing to do, and more than that all agree, with the exception of one or two, to sign the petition about to be passed around, on the condition that all sign. Now what I want to say is this, to those who have signified their intention not to sign the agreement. First, what will you gain by it? Are you going to get any more business, thus making an extra dollar. No, for if you do keep open, the other stores will too, and therefore you will be no better off. But you say many persons cannot very well get all their shopping done before eight, and we want to be here to supply our customers. You do! eh? Well try it on; stay till eleven and you will have an odd customer come in at that hour. I don't care how late you keep open or how early you close, but it is doubtful to me if it pays one-fourth of the business men to keep open after eight. Count your profits after that hour and then deduct your light and wear and tear of yourself, and I doubt if it pays for the light alone. Now just look at the position you are putting yourselves in. You are robbing yourselves of an hour's recreation, an hour's work around your home, an hour from your family, while it is a gross injustice to keep your clerks when there is only bums and loafers sitting around your store half the time, may three-fourths of the time, and worse than that to the avaricious, for you do not make any more money by it. Business men of Albany, let me ask you this question, would not the same amount of business be done if you closed at eight as there is now? Then why not make it a general affair. It is not for my own personal interest that I advocate this, but on principle. All will benefit by it. And now, gentlemen, if you can influence those in your own lines of business so as to make a general movement to close at 8 p. m., (say for 3 months to give it a fair trial,) you will not only be doing a justice to yourselves, doing a justice to your homes and bringing upon yourselves the well wishes of every one.

Caroline Gage and The Keene's in "Queen."

The Portland Oregonian in criticising Caroline Gage's performance of "Queen," the piece in which she opens her engagement here to-night, speaks in a highly complimentary manner as follows:

Keene's company of players, with Miss Caroline Gage as leading lady made their first appearance before a Portland audience at the New Park theater last night in the beautiful drama of "Queen." Manager Howe must certainly have thought last night that the Portland public had not entirely forgotten him, by the way they poured into the theater. Long before 8 o'clock the house was packed, and at 8 o'clock the sign "standing room only" was put out. Even this did not restrain the crowd and soon the gallery was filled with ladies and their escorts, and a number of people who came late and could get no seats, were obliged to go home and come earlier some other evening during the week.

"Queen" has been played in Portland several times, so that the plot is pretty well known to most people. The play, however, has so many pleasing points and pretty scenes that it has always been a favorite.

Miss Gage's portrayal of the character of Queen, was certainly a revelation to the audience. Coming almost unannounced, it was hardly expected to see the performance that was given. The lady is the fortunate possessor of a very handsome face and figure, and in addition possesses talent rarely given to woman. Her acting in the mad scene of the fourth act was such as will entitle her to recognition in any clime as an artist of ability. Her conception of the injured wife in the fifth act, and also the reconciliation was excellent, and the recourse to handkerchiefs among the audience showed their appreciation of her efforts. Miss Gage was honored with most vociferous applause during the evening and was called before the curtain at the end of the fourth act.

Miss Lydia Knott, Florence Fletcher, is also entitled to praise.

Miss Maude Howe, as Alice Sinclair, was also good in the character of the soap boiler's daughter who barter her gold for a title.

Mr. George Hillyer as Lord Huntington, the husband of Queen, was a clever piece of acting, especially in the scenes where he is blind, where the quiet intensity of his love for his lost wife shows itself.

Kent Thomas as John H. Wilkins, is the comedian of the play, and a right good one he is, too.

Mr. H. E. Keene, as the Earl of Chandos, showed that he is an old stager.

Mr. James Morton was very clever as Frank Horton. In fact, the entire company is one that shows careful study and management.
