A general discussion followed on the proper matter to present to the consideration of Mr Huntington, and the following committee of arrangements and reception was appointed, with full power to act: Mayor J L Cowan, S E Young, E J Flinn, Judge Strahan and Capt E J Lanning.

A SUGGESTIVE ITEM FOR LINK.—Some persons have ignorantly or maliciously given small circulation to the report that Polk county has not agreed to pay her share of the big steel bridge, one-third, \$20,000. At first the Polk county court did contend that that county should only pay one-third of the excess over \$60,000, which would have left a deficiency of nearly \$7000; but afterwards the Polk county court agreed to stand \$20,000 of the cost. Marion county pays the same sum, the city has voted bonds for a like amount. This provides \$60,000, which, with the material of the old bridge, will pay the cost of the new \$71,000 steel structure. —Statesman.

A CLOSE CALL.

A Brother-in-Law Uses A Knife.

Yesterday Clint Cole and his brother-in-law Jack Barnes, of Millers, were in the city, and though reported not to be on very good terms, they navigated together and filled up on about the same kind of tantular juice. Going home late in the afternoon they disagreed materially on all the live issues of the day, resulting in a free fight, in their dogcart. Cole drew his knife and gave Barnes a frightful cut in the face, beginning on the forehead and slanting down along the right side of the nose, past the mouth to his chin. The blood flowed very freely. An Albany man, who met them going to Jefferson, Cole driving and Barnes sitting with his head in his hands, said the bottom of the cart was covered with clotted blood. Barnes' wounds were dressed by a Jefferson surgeon. Cole, who told the story of the fight, was arrested by the city marshal there and brought to Albany. Justice Humphrey was called out at 11 o'clock and issued a commitment, when Cole was placed in the county jail.

Mr Cole was taken before Justice Humphrey this afternoon, but Barnes refused to appear against him and he was discharged.

The Delsarte movements were well represented, with a slow grace and precision, bringing every muscle into play by the simplest and most natural efforts, and formed a series of pleasing pictures.

CROOK COUNTY.—S J Newson left on Monday for Kentucky, where he expects to invest in some fine stock which he will import to this county. He will be gone four or five weeks.

Ed Evans, who was in town Thursday, reports that Joe Swain, of Bear Creek, has succeeded in raising 115 lambs for every roe ewe he had in his band. Such an increase seems almost incredible.

Three years ago E Barnes sent 90 head of horses, mostly brood mares, to the Malheur country in charge of the Howard Bros. They had increased to quite a band but the past winter wiped them all out.

Some time since mention was made of the fact that the Narrow Gauge railroad in the Willamette valley was being widened to standard gauge, and that a company had taken charge of the road and proposed to extend it across the Cascades, via the Penra route, reaching into Eastern Oregon. It now appears that the object of the company is to get across the Cascades and then work its way northward into the wheat producing section surrounding Pendleton. If this is the objective point, it is possible that the road may come up Crooked river, on through the Ochoco valley, across the mountains to the Bridge creek and John Day country. —Review.

BUCKY PAINTERS.—One of the best painted houses in Albany is that of Mr Edward Zeyss on Lyon Street, just finished by Miller & Hart, the house and sign painters. They not only have gained a splendid reputation as sign painters, but, as well, have their hands full of painting residences and blocks, always doing fine work. Among the many large jobs they have ahead are the large Solvay Hotel, now being built; Rev Kirkpatrick's new residence at Seattle, to be finished in about a month; the new Oregon Bank, the Presbyterian parsonage, etc.

AGAINST THE OREGON PACIFIC.—In the case of J R Myers & Co., contractors, vs the Oregon Pacific Railroad company, tried in Benton county last week, the jury after being out six hours returned a verdict in favor of the plaintiffs for \$8,000. The amount sued for was \$125,000. Rufus Mallory, of Portland, and L L Flinn, of Albany, were attorneys for the defendants and J K Weatherford, and two other prominent attorneys were for the Plaintiffs.

NARROW GAUGE ACCIDENT.—An accident occurred on the narrow gauge railroad near Mount Angel Saturday which resulted very luckily in the fact that there was no serious injury to any person and but little to property. The principal passenger car was thrown from the track and all the windows on one side broken, the passengers, to the number of ten or fifteen being scared out of their wits. —Journal.
