SECULAR SITUATION.—Cook county is in a very peculiar situation in reference to money, as the following from the following indicates: The school superintendent of the April apportionment of county funds to the different districts in private. Owing to the small amount of funds that have been collected, the funds in the county treasury amounted to about \$7500, which is not enough to make the apportionment of \$50 each to the districts entitled to money.

A HOSE TEST.—The following hose test recently made in San Francisco will be of general interest as showing the great power lost by long hose: "In the first test 100 feet of hose were used, which threw a stream a distance of 206 feet, and showed a pressure of 90 pounds at the nozzle. In the second test 200 feet of hose were used, and a stream of water was thrown a distance of 174 feet at first trial, and at the second, after some washers had been put on the hose to stop leakage, 182 feet, and showed a pressure at the nozzle of 70 pounds. In the third test 300 feet of hose were used, and the stream was thrown 160 feet, with 30 pounds pressure at the nozzle. In the fourth test 400 feet of hose were used, and the stream was thrown 148 feet, with a pressure at the nozzle of 10 pounds. In the fifth test 500 feet of hose were used, a stream was thrown 85 feet, with a pressure at the nozzle of 10 pounds. In the sixth test, with 1000 feet of hose, a stream was thrown a distance of 54 feet, showing a pressure of 6 pounds at the nozzle. This last test showed that when the nozzle was turned straight up, the stream would barely reach the top of the second-frame buildings in the neighborhood, and that there was scarcely any pressure at all. A seventh test was added, in which only 100 feet of hose were used, in order to prove the first test made at the same distance. The result showed they were substantially alike."

A NIGHT OF TABLEAU.—Next Monday night our citizens will be given an opportunity to attend a novel entertainment for Albany. It will be a night of pantomime tableaux of great beauty as well as an evening of song and music. ITS FUTURE GROWTH ASSURED.—President Reid, of the Astoria and South Coast Railway Co., in his recent report to the directors, says: "There are only four large sea ports on the Pacific Coast of the United States; San Diego, San Francisco, Puget Sound and Astoria, the last named the terminus of your road, which with suburbs, has seven miles of deep water frontage adjoining the jetty improvements, made by the government at an expense of \$2,000,000. With steamers a connection in twenty-six hours is had between Astoria and all ports on Puget Sound, without constructing any railway there to. When the steamboat railway at the Upper Cascades is finished, the interior river grain traffic of Eastern Oregon and Washington for 800 miles will terminate at Astoria, and there be placed on foreign bottoms to Europe, just as the Willamette Valley and Western Oregon grain trade will do at Astoria, when this road is connected with the valley system of roads. The growth of Astoria is thus assured. The Oregon Land Co., has lots in Astoria which it offers as desirable bargains."

HUNTINGTON'S DOINGS.

The Albany Committee Meet Him.

The train arriving from Portland last evening contained a special car with the President of the road, C. P. Huntington, and Manager A. N. Towne, on board. Mayor Cowan, S. E. Young, President of the Board of Trade, Dr. G. W. Maston, Southern Pacific Surgeon for this district, Judge Fling, President of the First National Bank, Supreme Judge R. S. Strahan, C. E. Wolverton and Wm. Vance, met them at the depot and were invited into the car, where an informal interview was indulged in, as much on one side as the other. Mr. Huntington promised a close railroad connection between the Lebanon branch and the Narrow Gauge, and pronounced the Willamette one of the finest countries he had ever visited. In response to a suggestion as to what he might do for Albany he replied that if the committee before him were a sample nothing was necessary as the city was bound to force ahead with such men to push matters. He gave an incident to illustrate the power of individual effort to secure immigration, each working among his former neighbors in the East, and said it was more effective than all the advertising schemes combined. The committee was very favorably impressed with Mr. Huntington and Mr. Towne and reported the interview as being a very genial one.

It is reported that Mr. Huntington signed an agreement in Portland, to build the Southern Pacific into Astoria in consideration of the raising of a subsidy of \$200,000; but in reference to it the Oregonian says, in its usual cold water style: "It is understood that he has taken the proposition of the Astoria people under advisement, but has given them no definite assurance that he will build the road. The conversation of the Astoria delegation, however, leaves no doubt that they will give it out solid that the road will be built. Their representations, however, must be received with care, as it is extremely doubtful. Mr. Huntington says, whether they will be able to raise the requisite subsidy."
