LEAD HIM NOT INTO TEMPTATION.

The resolution regarding the Willamette Locks, adopted at the close of the Democratic State Convention, has a significance perhaps not understood by all. As stated therein, the act which authorized the building of the locks reserved the privilege of their purchase by the state within twenty years from the time of their completion, which time will expire in 1892. The corporation that now owns the locks is very anxious to sell them, and, of course, wishes the state to pay an exorbitant price therefor. Mr. D. P. Thompson, candidate for governor, is, it is said, really if not openly one of the largest stockholders in this corporation. The question simply is: Is it wise to put Mr. Thompson, with his well-known ability for money making for a gentleman named D. P. Thompson, in a position as unpropitious as a matter where there is a half-million dollars of the state's money at stake? Already, during the last two sessions of the legislature a lobby in the interest of the sale of the locks has been at work; and will doubtless come again. Can any one doubt that they will come with a great deal more courage and expectancy of securing a big slice of plunder from the state if Mr. Thompson is elected instead of that inflexible protector of the people, Sylvester Pennoyer?

There was also a proposition in the last legislature for the state to purchase the almost worthless and certainly dangerous electric light plant now in the state house, and for the use of which under contract it is paying \$5,000 a year. Doubtless if Mr. Thompson is elected this proposition will be urged again, and with far greater hope of success, for Mr. Thompson owns the plant or a very large proportion of it himself.

We do not say that Mr. Thompson would rob the state for the purpose of assisting to make these sales to it, but there is no need of putting him in the way of temptation. We know pretty well what Mr. Pennoyer would do if any bill on these subjects were not square and reasonable.

FACING A DEFICIENCY.

President Harrison, according to one of his faithful organs, "has become alarmed on account of the many and large appropriations for public buildings and other purposes." It is intimated that he may "feel compelled to interpose official objections to excessive appropriations."

This is what a Democratic President did, and for doing which he was roundly abused by the Republican orators and organs. Can it be possible that Benjamin Harrison is to imitate his predecessor and interpose his veto to prevent the execution of his party's policy to promote prosperity and make everybody happy by distributing the Surplus among the people? It is incredible.

In his letter of acceptance Mr. Harrison sneered at the Democrats for having "magnified and nursed the Surplus." The Republicans pursued the opposite policy. They have diminished and mortgaged the Surplus. And it is too late for the President to stop the "excessive liberality" even if he were disposed to do it.

That there is reason for the President's alarm is obvious. By his organ's own showing the revenues of the Government will be cut down to \$114,000,000 "if the pending Tariff bill or any other of similar character" is to be passed. The ordinary expenditures for the next fiscal year are estimated by Secretary Windom at \$392,000,000, besides \$49,000,000 for the Sinking Fund. This would involve a deficiency of \$27,000,000. But if the bills now before Congress and to which the party is pledged should pass "the aggregate for the year would exceed \$446,000,000." On this basis the deficiency would be \$132,000,000.

The Republican party found a Surplus and is facing a deficiency. It is no wonder that under pretense of reducing the revenue, it has reported a bill increasing the taxes in twelve of the thirteen schedules.

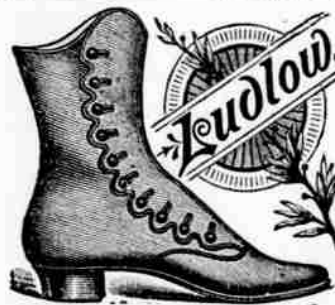
