THE REAL QUESTION.

Governor Pennoyer is asking re-election upon an issue whose fundamental structure is free trade, and the consequent destruction of the wool and sheep industry of this state, and the reduction of wages for working men. That is the simple fact of the case when diverted of all its sophistical presentation. The question before the Oregon voters is simply whether they are ready to sustain such a regime or not, and the result in June will show how the people stand upon these questions, just as the result in the last Presidential election exhibited the mind of the people on the same subjects.—*Herald.*

The *Herald* rings the changes on "free trade," but it has not light enough on the tariff question to tell what "free trade" is, or what it means by the term "free trade." There seems to be nothing about its eyes but wool. It sees no interest in all this land but the wool interests. It would give one wool man the benefit of protection at the expense of the twenty men who consume that wool. In its blindness it denounces the man who favors free wool as a "free trader" while it heartily endorses the McKinley bill that puts sugar on the free list. It does not appear to be able to comprehend the axiomatic truth that, if the man who favors putting wool on the free list is a "free trader" then the man who favors putting sugar on the free list must be a "free trader." In its better days the *Herald* was disposed to promote the interests of our farmers whose business seems so fearfully depressed at this time. But now it stands up solidly for the Portland "ring" candidate for governor, a millionaire banker, whose friends boast that, with his seventeen banks, he can buy the office of governor. Dave endorses the McKinley tariff bill that increases the duties on jute sacks and thus further depresses the farmers. Pennoyer, as his administration shows, stands for what is honest and economical in state affairs while Dave Thompson is simply an avaricious money getter. Mark our word for it that the vote of Oregon will tell very strongly against him next month.

Orders have been sent out from the republican headquarters at Portland to the faithful all over the state, and especially among farmers and rural people, to make a defense for their candidate for governor, D P Thompson, on the water bond question by saying that Dave was opposed to non-taxable bonds but that he had to vote for them. This argument was being made to an ardent republican granger the other day, when he opened his eyes and said: "So our candidate was actually opposed to the issue of non-taxable bonds was he?" "Yes," answered Dave's defender. "And he voted for the water bonds, did he?" "Yes," again answered the friend of David. "Well," said the republican granger, "a man who has no more back bone than that is not fit to be governor, and he will not get my vote though I had intended to vote for him until I heard of this. I will vote for the brave, honest, courageous, Pennoyer." go it will be seen this argument is a boomerang on David.

Mr A LeRoy the democratic candidate for state superintendent of Public Instruction is a man of finished education, thoroughly imbued with the idea that education should be of the practical sort, and not of that new fangled style calculated to load them so heavily as to break them down with useless expense. He with Col Miller opens the campaign to-day (Saturday) at Astoria and will canvass the whole state. We advise democrats and republicans alike to go and hear him as he is one of the best and most fluent orators of the state.

Judge Whitney, the democratic candidate for prosecuting attorney of the third judicial district has served in that capacity before. He is industrious and energetic and will make it hot, so to speak, for his opponent.

THE DIFFERENCE.

ITS FUTURE GROWTH ASSURED.—President Reid, of the Astoria and South Coast Railway Co., in his recent report to the directors, says: "There are only four large safe ocean ports on the Pacific Coast of the United States; San Diego, San Francisco, Puget Sound and Astoria, the last named the terminus of your road, which with suburbs, has seven miles of deep water frontage adjoining the jetty improvements, made by the government at an expense of \$2,000,000. With steamers a connection in twenty-six hours is had between Astoria and all ports on Puget Sound, without constructing any railway there to. When the steamboat railway at the Upper Cascades is finished, the interior river grain traffic of Eastern Oregon and Washington for 800 miles will terminate at Astoria, and there be placed on foreign bottoms to Europe, just as the Willamette Valley and Western Oregon grain trade will do at Astoria, when this road is connected with the valley system of roads. The growth of Astoria is thus assured." The Oregon Land Co., has lots in Astoria which it offers as desirable bargains.

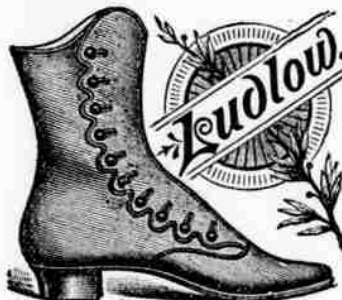
