COLLAPSED.—Last week the reporter for the News paid a short visit to Anacortes. Reports had been in circulation for some time that the boom had collapsed, which was found to be true. People are leaving the town on every boat, and at the present writing there is a population, aside from railroad laborers, of about 200. This is certainly a great drop from 1000, which was claimed at one time for the city. But what does this exodus signify? Simply nothing, as it is composed in a great measure of people who had only \$100 or \$200 when they went there and spent it all in making the first payment on a lot, or building a shack on a leased lot, and when the reaction came, which was plainly foreseen from the start, they were forced to leave. —Sagitt News, April 26.

THE EAGLE MILLS.—Annual meeting of the stockholders of the Eagle Woolen Mills Co. was held at their office in North Brownsville, Oregon, April 29th. The following directors were elected: W. R. Kirk, P. Hume, J. J. White and Hugh Fields. After the reports of Secretary, Treasurer, and W. R. Bishop, agent, were read it was voted to make a dividend of 10 per cent on capital stock, part of the net earnings of the company. The business has proved a success in every sense of the term, and will continue under the supervision of its former officers. Four new looms, one rotary press and other machinery are to arrive in a few weeks, and the factory will be run to its fullest capacity. —Times.

FAITH IN SMALL FARMS.—The Oregon Railway Extension Co. recently filed at Olympia supplementary articles of incorporation authorizing it to build 3000 miles of new lines in the northwest. Thus one movement complements another. Some cautious souls have expressed the fear that the extension of the fruit raising industry in this region would overstock the market, and here we have facilities to be provided that will allow us to reach out for a more distant market in all directions. The Oregon Land Co. has faith in its small fruit farms, and to show its faith by its crops has just planted an orchard of 100 acres to retire to when all the land hereabout is sold.

EVANGELICAL CONFERENCE.

A Brief Outline of Bishop Bowman's Address on the Difficulties in the Church.

This afternoon at 2 o'clock Bishop Bowman gave an address at the Evangelical Church setting forth, in detail, the difficulties in that church, leading up to the present unpleasantness, an account of which has been given in the DEMOCRAT. Below we give the substance of the Bishop's remarks:

The difficulties in the Evangelical church commenced to some extent 28 years ago, when the present venerable senior Bishop, J. J. Esner, was elected bishop. His opposing candidate was Rev. S. Neitz, a very able and eloquent divine. The relative strength of the two was so evenly matched that Esner was elected only by a very small margin. There was considerable feeling engendered, and hence some opposition shown towards the elected bishop. Things however ran on without much friction until in 1875, when Rudolph Dubs and Thomas Bowman were elected bishops by the general conference in Philadelphia. Dubs being especially the candidate of those who were more or less opposed to Bishop Esner, and, as he has himself since confessed to three different parties that he was under the impression that he was elected to put down Bishop Esner, he seized upon every opportunity public and private to accomplish that end. Evidence could be furnished in abundance. Only two years after his election he publicly attacked his senior in office and years during an annual conference session, and led the conference to pass resolutions censuring Bishop Esner in his absence. Later on the general conference which has had jurisdiction expanded this action from the minutes of that conference. Finally at the session of the general conference, held in Allentown, Pa., in 1883, these matters were brought before that body, and after full statements had been made, Bishop Dubs was compelled publicly to acknowledge that he had wronged his senior in office in four or five instances, and upon this confession and implied promises on his part, matters were amicably adjusted. Bishop Esner even going so far for the sake of peace and harmony as to allow a matter to stand as a misunderstanding, where the proof of a willful falsehood on the part of Bishop Dubs was in his possession, black on white, and other misrepresentations were easy of proof. However, instead of Dubs mending his ways he continued in his course, especially in difficulties connected with the management of the missionary operations in Japan to injure his senior wherever possible, besides laying himself open to very serious charges concerning his veracity and chastity. Dubs had become so obnoxious to the majority of the church that at the last general conference held in Buffalo, N. Y., in 1887, he was only re-elected by a majority of one vote, and that, after his friends had engaged in an active personal campaign for his re-election, and even he personally in three instances which can be proven begged delegates to vote for his re-election, pleading his former services and his family. Since then his conduct became still more unendurable. He publicly charged a minister and a layman with falsifying a cable dispatch and presenting it in evidence in the trial of John B. Hartzler, while it was proven at his trial by about thirty witnesses that no dispatch of any kind had been presented at all. In addition he made statements to the conference in Germany and Switzerland and in the official papers, which were proven by some thirty old witnesses, to have been untrue. Besides three or four private assertions reiterated to different individuals were proven to be untrue. In addition to all these things were added the painful rumors affecting his purity and chastity; so that after a trial by fifteen representative men whose integrity and intelligence cannot be questioned they unanimously suspended him from the office of the ministry until the next general conference which meets in 1891.

In addition to these things came the difficulties of our Japan mission, which resulted in charges being brought against H. B. Hartzler, the former official editor of the English weekly organ of the church. Of these charges he was found guilty and deposed from office. Then his friends organized a Publishing Company and named him their editor in opposition to the official church papers. In this paper all manner of bad things were said against Bishop Esner and myself, so that it was believed necessary to have an examination in accordance with the regulations of our discipline, which examination was conducted by three elders who exonerated each one of us fully from all blame. However in order to bring further reproach upon the church, and to keep the suspended Bishop Dubs, his friends ignored these legal examinations and acquittals, and drew up charges against us principally drawn from our public correspondence and articles relative to the disturbing faction, and the very faction against which what we had written was directed attempted to sit in judgment upon the truthfulness of what we had said of their conduct. Of course having been examined and honorably acquitted we gave the sham trials to which we were cited no attention whatever and have gone on with our work as usual and propose to do so. Since these sham trials 13 annual conferences have been held, all of which have endorsed us in our position, and of the 25 conferences no doubt 29 will fully endorse our position. There is no doubt whatever as to what the coming general conference will do. Nor is there any doubt as to what the coming session of the board of Missions will do. The appropriations will be paid to the conference over which I preside, and which is the only Oregon Conference of the Evangelical church. The meeting held in this city will have no more legal standing at the next general conference than if so many boys had held a "conference" on a vacant lot somewhere in this city.

WEATHER CROP BULLETIN NO. 5.

Of the Oregon State Weather Bureau, co-operating with U. S. Signal Service, Central Office, Portland, Oregon, for the week ending Saturday, May 3rd, 1890:

WEATHER.
The temperature for the past week has been above the normal. Since January 1st, it has averaged below the normal. There was no rainfall during the week. From January 1st to date, more than the average amount has fallen, from July 1st, 1889, to date, about the average has fallen. The amount of sunshine has been above the average for the week. Almost cloudless weather has prevailed during the past seven days. The nights have been much warmer, and no frosts are reported. This is the second week of good growing weather this season and all vegetation has shown the beneficial effect of the weather. While the low lands are generally moist yet general rain would prove beneficial.

CEREALS.
Winter and spring sown wheat is reported to be in excellent condition. "Prospects were never better at this season for a bountiful wheat crop," is reported from various wheat districts. Early spring sown grain is up; the late sown would be materially benefited by rain.

FRUIT.
The weather has been especially favorable to the fruit crop. The warmer nights and bright sunshine have done much towards advancing the fruit past its stage liable to be injured by frost. The peaches and apple crop will be less than an average; other fruits and berries give promise of immense yields. Many acres of new orchards will come into bearing this year.

GENERAL REMARKS.
In Washington county, maple, alder and hazel are in leaf one month later than last year. Ground is in excellent condition. In Clackamas, the ground is drying out. On the uplands of the Willamette valley rain especially is needed. In Benton, at the Agricultural College, grasses are heading out, garden peas quite high, radishes and lettuce growing finely, strawberries as large as a dime, apple trees in full bloom. Oak trees have generally leafed out in Western Oregon. In Douglas county, in neighborhood of Roseburg, the peach crop generally killed by the April frosts. In Jackson county, grape vines budding out one month later than last year. In Eastern Oregon sheep shearing is in full swing, the clip is good and wool weighing well. Plums and prunes in the interior sections in blossom. The grain prospects throughout this section were never better. Spring grain is generally up.
