A RIGHTEOUS JUDGMENT.

Some time ago Mr Kizer, editor of the Ashland Record, becoming tired of what appeared to him as corrupt practices in the courts of the First District, proceeded to publish a criticism of Judge Webster who wears the judicial ermine on the bench of that district, whereupon the irate judge had the recalcitrant editor dragged before him and fined him \$50 and imprisoned him in the county jail for 15 days all for "contempt of court." This Jeffery-like proceeding met with the earnest disapproval of Mr Kizer, the editor, who promptly appealed the case to the Supreme Court, and the decision of Webster's court was of course, promptly reversed. Mr Kizer is to be congratulated that in his person the freedom of the press has been judicially vindicated. Judge Webster will learn from this that men who don the judicial ermine are subject to criticism the same as other officials are when they get out of the fine of honest public duty.

PROVES TOO MUCH.

Before the tariff was levied on plate-glass, when all that was sold was imported, it cost \$1 a square foot. One factory was then built in this country and asked protection, so a tariff of 20 per cent was levied on plate-glass. According to the free traders "a tariff is a tax," and plate-glass should then have cost \$1.20 a square foot. But, instead of that, the price was soon reduced to 50 cents a square foot.—*Astorian.*

Fools may be made to believe it, but no man of sense can be made to believe that manufacturers would come up and ask congress to place a duty on the article which they manufacture if they knew that the duty would compel them to sell at a less price than they did before the duty was laid. If a tariff reduces the price of the domestic article then manufacturers would oppose the tariff. The *Astorian* proves too much.
