THURSDAY MORNING SESSION, MAY 6, 1890.

After the conference was regularly opened by the bishop, business was transacted with much dispatch. The following resolutions were passed:

Resolved: That the trustees of the Oregon conference are authorized to contest all conveyance of property, situated within the bounds of this conference, that may be attempted by any of the men who withdrew from this conference.

Whereas: J. Bowersox, C. C. Poling, F. S. Locke, H. L. Pratt, F. S. Locke, J. M. Dick, A. R. Johnson, J. H. Hershner, C. M. Plowman, J. M. Beauchamp, Y. A. Yost and L. Seibert consented to and participated in the disgraceful affair referred to above (disgraceful row at the opening of the session) against the word of God, the laws and order of our church, and having deliberately withdrawn from this conference, and

Whereas: This conference by resolutions in the name of the conference, the above named persons should be dealt with in a forbearing spirit and Christian manner, should they choose to return, and

Whereas: This offer was treated with contempt, therefore,

Resolved, That C. C. Poling, F. S. Locke, E. S. Hollinger and J. H. Hershner, whose conduct was most offensive, and who seemed to be leaders in the revolutionary proceedings, have by their public conduct forfeited all the rights and privileges as ministers and members of the Evangelical association, are hereby deposed from office, from the office of the ministry and expelled from the church; and that J. Bowersox, H. L. Pratt, J. M. Dick, A. R. Johnson, C. M. Plowman, Y. A. Yost, J. M. Beauchamp and J. Seibert are suspended from all their official functions and from all the rights and privileges of membership in our church until the next annual conference.

Resolved, That the persons elected by the conference to offices made vacant by the suspension of the persons above mentioned shall demand of their predecessors in office all moneys, books and documents and other property belonging to this conference now in their possession; and all persons whom it may concern are hereby informed and notified that J. Bowersox and J. L. Hershner are no longer trustees of the Oregon conference of the Evangelical association, and any act of theirs pertaining to the conference is null and void and will be repudiated by this conference.
