Do not forget that Col R A Miller and Mr A LeRoy, democratic candidates for congress and state superintendent of public instruction, will address the people of Linn county at Albany on Friday May 9th at 1 o'clock p m. Everybody turn out and hear them.

Dr J F Henry, F C Hansard and C J Shedd, are all suitable and fit persons to represent the people of Linn county in the legislature. The democrats should see that they all get a full vote.

William Rumbaugh is a man of sound judgment and will make a good county commissioner. Democrats should bear in mind that if Mr Rumbaugh be defeated the republicans will then have a majority of the county court.

The disaffection over the nomination of Dave Thompson that showed itself so plainly in Portland is rapidly spreading to all parts of the state. We have no hesitation in making the prediction that governor Pennoyer will run materially ahead of his ticket in every county in the state.

**WHAT DOES IT THINK?**

The Eugene Register very approvingly parades the following plank of the republican platform to show that its party is opposed to the issue of non-taxable bonds: "That we are in favor of a fair and equal distribution of taxation, and we believe, that all property now exempt by law should contribute its due proportion of the legitimate expenses of government."

Now this resolution does not cover the matter of bonds at all for it only extends to property now exempt and not to bonds to be issued hereafter. This is one of the tricks of the cunning scribe who drew that platform. It was drawn to catch the unwary and the Register walked straight into the trap. By the way has the Register duly considered the import of this plank in the republican platform? It pledges the party to tax all property now exempt by law. Under the present law personal property of all literary, benevolent, scientific institutions, and the real estate occupied by such institutions for the purpose of carrying out the objects for which they were incorporated; all houses of public worship, and the lots on which they are situated, and the pews and slips in such churches burial grounds and tombs, and public libraries are exempt from taxation, but under the resolution above quoted the republican party declares in favor of taxing this property. That party is therefore, pledged to tax all the property of the churches, Odd Fellows, Masons, Ancient Order of United Workmen, Knights of Pythias etc. What, in view of this, does the Register think of the attitude of its party on this subject? Is it in favor of taxing church property? "Would it tax a grave yard?"

**WATER BONDS.**

The DEMOCRAT is in receipt of the following from Center precinct:

"A dispute has arisen here whether the republicans in their state convention put a plank in their platform opposing the issue of non taxable bonds by cities or towns. I have been requested by a number of voters, republicans as well as democrats, to ask the DEMOCRAT to answer the question."

To "Republican" we would say they did not. Dave Thompson, the republican candidate for governor settled the question as to that subject at the last session of the legislature. He voted in the legislature to authorize the issue of such bonds and it would make no difference what kind of a platform the party adopted in convention, we know what Thompson would do were he in the governor's chair. He would cheerfully sign such a bill if passed by the legislature. Governor Pennoyer would as courageously and conscientiously veto it. A bill will again be introduced and the question of its becoming a law will likely depend upon who will be elected governor.

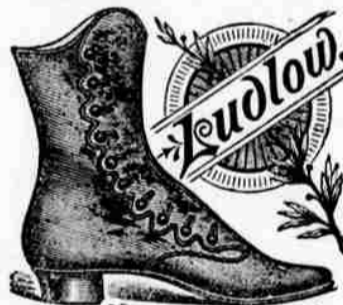
