DICKY BURNED OUT.—A house near the penitentiary at Salem, occupied by I. C. Dickey, Frank Bryant and R. J. Savage was entirely consumed by fire yesterday. The Statesman says: The dwelling was consumed, but little was lost outside this. Mr. Dickey suffered the loss of all his kitchen furniture and eatables, making a loss of \$100 probably; the other families saved everything. The house was insured for \$400 in the German-American Insurance company which amount will just pay the loss. The families of Bryant and Savage are camping out, being unable to obtain a house, while Mr. Dickey succeeded in finding an empty dwelling late in the evening.
