HOW THEY WANT TO DO IT.

The republicans at the state convention in Portland on Wednesday, April 10th, adopted as part of their platform the following plank:

"Eight—That we are in favor of a fair and equal distribution of taxation, and we believe that all property not now exempt by law should contribute its due proportion in payment of legitimate expense of the government. That we are in favor of the adoption of such amendment to our assessment laws as will secure the equal and just assessment and taxation of all property at its true value."

In order to carry out their virtuous intentions they nominate for governor Hon-orable David P. Thompson, banker, money lender, and public spirited (?) citizen, who has acquired the bulk of his wealth by systematically dodging his share of taxation and compelling the less wealthy citi-zens of Multnomah county and of the state to pay it for him. His assessment for tax-ation for 1890 in Multnomah county is \$171,700.00 of which there is exempted as claimed by him: for indebtedness \$33,000.00 and \$200.00 exempted by law. The following table shows his holdings, the amount assessed at and actual market value of it, showing how his less wealthy neighbors who hold property in Multnomah county and through the state are compelled to assume the burden he shifts on them:

 Being about 1/8th of the taxes which the Hon D P Thompson ought to have paid, the 7/8ths of it had to be paid by the other taxpayers of this city, county and state.
 The following is a list of the taxable property of the Hon D P Thompson from the year 1887 to 1889 by which it will be seen that in 1887 the Honorable gentlemen was in reduced circumstances, being worth in worldly goods and chattels after deducting his indebtedness only \$16,175. But on Lordy, the following year 1888, either through an oversight in not deducting any indebtedness or because of an un-friendly feeling on behalf of the assessor of this county, or because the Lord prospered him exceedingly during the past year, his assessment was \$238,050. But he equalized it the following year, 1889, in which year he lost a little over \$200,000. (And this was not the year in which the bonds were stolen) for in 1889 his assess-

ment was only \$37,200. In 1886 it was \$50,000 in 1887 101,000. But between 1887 and 1888 his worldly goods increased only by \$9,000. But that year was a bad year. It was the year he was receiver of the Holiday estate, but from 1888 to 1889, it must have been quite a prosperous year, for he actually must have made \$25,000 in that year. A very large amount of money to make in one year, but there was one transaction in that year which is said yielded \$20,000 in a tump sum. Many of our citizens knew where that \$20,000 came from.
