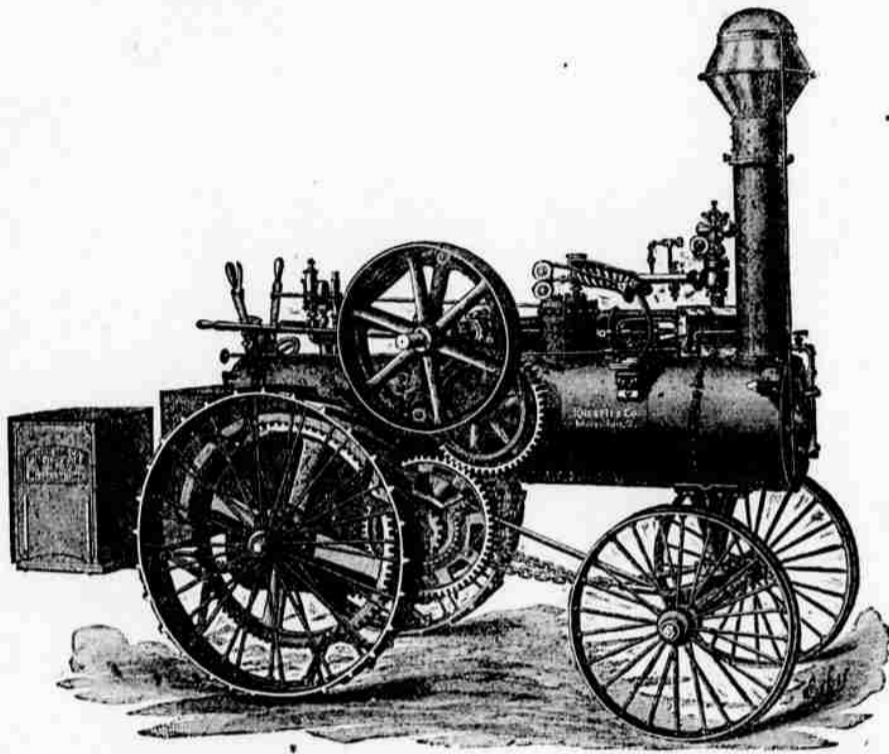

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

Crazy Indians. HELENA, May 13.—An Indian runner, who came in last night from Tongue river, says that couriers sent out by the Cheyenne Indians to find the new Messiah, or second Christ, saw him and talked with him. They located him in the mountains beyond Salt Lake, and from their description of him he is an old man with a long white beard, which hangs down over his breast. Some days he wears white hair, and at other times has no hair, on his head, from which it appears that he is bald. He wears a wig. He made one of the Cheyenne Indians who visited him a high priest, and instructed him in the rites and mysteries of the new religion. He gave him the figures and ceremonies of a new Indian dance, which takes four nights and one whole day to perform.

Remains Found. EUGENE, May 13.—An Indian S Powers came down from the Blue river mines last night and reported the finding by James Wycoff of the parts of the body of C. B. Hatch, who perished in an attempt to reach the summit of the mountain, December 31 last. A thigh bone and some pieces of clothing were found within half a mile of the Eugene Mining Company's cabin. The body had been devoured by wild beasts. Further search is being made.

Wouldn't Stand. VANCOUVER, B. C., May 13.—The large bridge across the north arm of the Fraser river suddenly collapsed this afternoon, throwing into the water four men who were on it. They were injured, but not, it is thought, severely. This bridge was built by the San Francisco Bridge Company for the provincial government last year. It collapsed from the pressure of ice last winter and the company were compelled to reinstate it. It now falls again, before the government has accepted the work.

A Peculiar Case. EUGENE, May 13.—The burial of the late Jeff Smith, who suicided last Sunday, took place to day under the auspices of the fire department. There was a very large attendance. It is some time that he had contemplated this act for he had tried to get the doctors to kill him as they said he must soon be rendered insane by a disease in the head. There is talk of the will being contested.

Excited Roseburg. ROSEBURG, May 13.—The river is very muddy, but the city water works are a success. A grand railroad ratification meeting was held on the streets to-night. Recently Roseburg subscribed her part of the railroad bonus, but last night an enthusiastic mass meeting, the balance of \$75,000 was signed, which means that Roseburg will have direct railroad communication with Coos bay within eighteen months. Bands are playing, cannon booming, Lane and others are speaking and everything is excitement. Real estate has advanced two per cent in the last week.

SUNNYSIDE FRUIT FARMS.—The SUNNYSIDE tract of farm lands was first put on the market by the Oregon Land Co. in February last, and nearly all of the 650 acres which comprise the tract is sold. A few 10 acre farms remain, and nothing more desirable to the settler of limited means is to be found around Salem. A small fruit farm at Sunnyside will soon become valuable property.
