PARTISAN TYRANNY.

There is nothing that better illustrates the republican view of the functions of congress than the refusal to admit New Mexico as a state. In the congressional elections of 1888, Idaho cast 14,555 votes and Wyoming 18,000. These Territories, however, were republican, and almost the first business presented to Mr Reed's house of representatives related to their admission into the union.

Meantime New Mexico was asking to be brought in, but the republicans refused to so much as consider a bill for that purpose unless the people would agree to a canvas of their vote by a Republican Returning Board. In 1888 New Mexico cast 30,612 votes, over 12,000 more than were cast in Wyoming and more than twice as many as were cast in Idaho, while the democrats were in the majority by nearly 2,000.

About a year ago the republicans of the territory, characteristically assuming the possession of all the political virtue of the community, adopted a constitution in their party convention. It seemed to them unnecessary to consult their democratic fellow-citizens, who number considerably more than half the population, but these democrats, anxious for statehood, agreed to accept the republican constitution.

This was not agreeable to the republican state-makers at Washington. They wanted to control the elections, and therefore refused their assent to the admission of New Mexico unless a federal board should be provided for and agreed to. They insisted on the power to doctor the returns. They refused to make New Mexico a state unless it could be made republican. In the ethics of this congress no territory is entitled to statehood which does not furnish two republican senators and a solid republican delegation in the Electoral College.

The republican politicians of Illinois are alarmed at the bright prospects of democratic success next fall, and at the love feast of the state central committee the other day office-holders of all kinds and party organizers from every district in the state admitted that dissensions and factional fights existed to a large extent. It was decided to hold the convention at Springfield, June 24, to nominate a State Treasurer, three Supreme Court clerks, three Appellate Court clerks and Superintendent of Public Instruction. The political situation indicates that the democrats will get a majority of one to three in the lower house next fall, and the republicans will probably have the same majority in the senate. This will lead to a repetition of the Logan deadlock days when the election of a successor to Senator Farwell comes up. Gen. Alger was at the meeting laying the wires for his presidential boom.

Pity the poor farmer. His profits mainly depend upon the amount of surplus grain marketed in Europe. The republican scheme of tariff, which directly increases his taxes, bids fair to restrict his cereals to the home market so much enlarged. This means ruin to the agriculturist, even now scarcely able to keep his land out of the sheriff's clutches. The introduction of the McKinley bill into congress has generated a movement in foreign commercial circles for common European action. In the way of retaliation. Probably the first result of the passage of the bill would be the closing of European ports to \$33,000,000 worth of corn annually, \$12,000,000 of wheat, \$46,000,000 of flour, \$23,000,000 of beef, \$67,000,000 of pork and \$10,000,000 of dairy products. In all \$221,000,000 of the fruits of our farms would be refused in Europe and thrown back upon an overstocked home market, lowering the prices paid to farmers for every thing they raise.

Among other things, the republican tariff bill more than doubles the duty on tin roofing plates. The present tax is \$1.05, but the proposed duty mounts up to \$2.42. Through committing the folly of depending upon the protectionists for tariff reform, the people will not only find it more costly to cover their backs and fill their stomachs, but to put a shelter

THOMPSON ON THE TARIFF.

The following letter written by J D Whitman was published in the Jacksonville Times last week. It contains truths that should be known by every voter in the land:

MEEDFORD, Oregon, May 3, 1890
TO THE EDITOR OF THE TIMES:
The republican candidate for governor, D P Thompson, while on a visit to Europe two years ago, hid himself over to Italy, and from that protected country (Italy and Spain are the two highest on the continent), sends home a campaign letter, in which he attempts to palm upon the people of Oregon quotations of the extremely low wages of Italy's protected paupers as the free-trade pauper wages of Europe. Free trade England pays the highest wages on the continent. Belgium, nearly a free-trade country, pays one seventh less wages than England. France, more protected than Belgium, pays one third less wages than England. Germany, a still higher protected country, pays only about half the wages of England. Italy, with higher protective policy than Germany, pays still less wages than Germany. The American Consul's reports show one remarkable fact, and that is, the higher protection the lower the wages throughout the European continent. Thompson may have been ignorant of these facts; but it is remarkable that he succeeded in finding the country that paid the least wages from which to quote to the laborers of Oregon. In that same letter he asks a question that indicates that he is very ignorant himself, or thought the people of this state certainly were, to-wit: If you take the duties off from wool what will become of the woolen factories of Ashland, Brownsville and Oregon city? To have brought forth such a brilliant idea, and launched it forth upon the world, must have racked his brain fearfully. It has one redeeming feature; it certainly was an original thought. To no sensible person, even ten years old, did it ever occur that lowering the cost of the raw material to the manufacturer would ruin his business. If he is as ignorant as his letter indicates, he is unfit to preside over the destinies of our state. If he is a deceiver, may God save us from such a governor. I will leave him to hang upon whichever horn of the dilemma he pleases, and wait for him to rise and explain.
