THE EVANGELICAL WAR.—The trouble in the Evangelical Church seems to have spread even into the quiet streets of Sweet Home, where war has been declared according to the following from a correspondence in the Express:

The Rev. Thos. A. Yost has been preaching at Sweet Home and vicinity for the last two years, and during all that time has done nothing to cause the least complaint, and has lived up to what he preached and won the best regard of the citizens of this community. Therefore the treatment he received yesterday has roused the just indignation of everyone who believes in fair play.

Yesterday morning Mr. Yost went to the Independence school house to fill his regular appointment, and upon rising to give out his text, was interrupted by John Spring, seconded by a Mrs. Rinehart, who raised such an uproar that Mr. Yost left rather than be made a party to such a disgraceful disturbance and went to fill another appointment and his friends went home. The Dutch reassembled in the school house to listen to one C. M. McElroy, a Bowmanite.

During the row it came out that the Bowman conference had sent orders to the trustees of the church at Sweet Home to lock out Mr. Yost and not let him preach in the building. Said church, be it understood, was built through and by Mr. Yost, he doing far more work than anyone else in its construction. Now if they sent such an order it stamps them, in the minds of all fair-minded men, as a set of black-hearted hypocrites, and as destitute of Christianity as a frog is of feathers.

Strange Affiliation.—William Nichols, of Milton, when gathering his horses last fall, found that a favorite Percheron colt was missing, and all efforts to find him proved unavailing, so the animal was abandoned to his fate, which no doubt would be that of a vast number that have found their way into the equine paradise through the inclemency of the present unusually severe winter. During the present week Mr. Nichols, accompanied by another gentleman, while hunting deer among the mountains that form the source of the Walla Walla river started a band of seventeen blackbills from a deep canyon, and to their surprise, observed a yearling colt speeding away with the band, apparently as frightened as the deer themselves. Although the colt had acquired their wildness by association, he lacked the speed of those mountain climbers, and was soon left far behind in the mad scramble over the rugged hills.
