THE STATE'S FINANCES.

When the present administration entered on active, official duty on January 10th, 1887, it found a State indebtedness, amounting in round numbers to \$100,000, the principal part of which, was against the Swamp Land Fund, and some other funds of a similar character. After carefully examining the books of his department, the Treasurer found that the sum of \$41,628 68 was due the State from the United States. That about \$23,000 of this had been due for two years, and not having been demanded, had lapsed back into the United States Treasury, and a reappropriation was necessary before it could be had. The remainder had been due nearly a year. This money was at once demanded and having been collected, was applied on the above indebtedness, on which the State had been paying to per cent interest. By properly applying on this indebtedness, the receipts from the sales of Swamp Land, and thereby cutting down the interest charge, the entire indebtedness of the State was liquidated inside of three years. And more than this. In addition to the above nearly \$25,000,000 has been refunded to the purchasers of Swamp Land, where the State failed to get the title.

An old resident of Clackamas county says that along in the 60's when the assessor was around, D P Thompson, who was then living in Oregon City, thought he had been robbed of \$50,000 or \$60,000 worth of notes, money and valuable papers, and that after the assessor was through assessing, D P Thompson found his property hidden in the barn. The resident says that he supposes Mr D P Thompson did lose the \$50,000 right enough, but whether he found it in time to pay taxes on it or not he does not know.

"Wonder if real estate is as high in Baker City as their lunches," was the expression made by "Dollar Mark" Thompson the other evening in a restaurant in this city when paying a seventy-five cent bill for himself and two invited friends after partaking of a bill of fare consisting of two poached eggs and a cup of coffee each. This shows his true trait of character. Money is his God, and while he has got a big one in the shape of \$2,000,000, he has not yet satisfied his greed. Oh, what a governor he would make!—Baker City Democrat.
