FROM HEADQUARTERS.—The following from the Corvallis Gazette, the Oregon Pacific's paper at that city, should settle the rumors about the O. P.: "From inquiry at the head office of the O. P. R. R. we learn that the special train referred to (by the Salem Statesman and published in the Democrat) was one placed at the disposal of the U. S. Local Inspectors at Portland, to facilitate an inspection of the steamship Willamette Valley then lying at Yaquina and just ready for use. We cannot trace any vestige of truth in the rumors of the Oregon Pacific selling out to the Southern Pacific. It reminds us of similar stuff that was flying round regarding a sell out to the Northern Pacific a few years back which, events shortly occurring very conclusively disproved. We agree with the Statesman that having built so far it is very unlikely that Col. Hogg and his brother will stop short of the completion of the road across the state. We hear that considerable work is being done by the company at the front in the repairing and refitting of the track east of Brown's mill, so as to facilitate operations for resuming work."

PACIFIC CITY claims to be "the second city in the state. Some of our esteemed contemporaries dispute B. C.'s claim. Tut, tut, brethren, Baker City is "the second city in the state," as you come east from the Oregon line. Entering the state from the west, Astoria is the first city in the state.—Astorian.

Bolled down, Astoria is the first city going up the Columbia, and Baker City the second coming into the state from the east. What city will be the first in importance ten years from now is a quandary, leaving Portland out; but keep your optics on Albany.

THE FUNERAL.—The body of Geo. S. Royce arrived in Albany this morning, accompanied by Mrs. Royce and son, Mrs. Strauder Froman and R. L. Burkhardt and mother. Funeral services will take place to-morrow afternoon at 2 o'clock, instead of to-day, as at first intended. The services will also include those of the infant child of the deceased who died about two months ago and whose remains were also brought back.

BIG DEAL.—It is reported that a belt of 20,000 acres of timber land in the vicinity of Buck Lake, and tributary to the Klamath river has been sold to a New York syndicate at \$1280 per acre of 160 acres, and that the same syndicate had bonded 80,000 acres of very choice land in the same section for \$12 per acre. A large portion of this timber land was filed on by Yreka parties. Gen. Russell A. Alger is one of this syndicate.—Ashland Record.
