LOCAL RECORD

A SPECIAL TRAIN.—The Examiner's special train will be in twenty minutes, said driver Westfall, on a street car to a DEMOCRAT man. The train, consisting of seven cars loaded with that paper's premiums consisting of wagons, reapers, horses, cows, bulls, phonographs, etc., arrived at the water tank and was boarded by several prominent citizens and a DEMOCRAT man. From and after June 1st to October 1st parties using water for sprinkling or irrigation purposes will be charged in addition to the regular rate for family use as follows:

For each lot or less, per month \$1.00
For each 2 lot or less, per month 1.75
For each additional lot, per month .50

To be paid on the first of each month in advance. Water for building purposes will be furnished on payment in advance on the written estimate of the manager or architect of the brick, stone, plastering or other material for which water is to be used. For material not stated in the estimate the application must be renewed.

A UNITED EFFORT.—A meeting of the Board of Trade was held Saturday evening at the council chambers to consider the plan of advertising the valley as a whole by the cities in it. W. F. Seaver and Frank Davy of the Salem Board of Trade were present and explained the plan as proposed by the Salem board, which was to spend \$1000 to \$1200 a month in stationing men at Portland, Seattle, Tacoma and Sacramento, with supplies of printed matter, to turn immigration towards the valley and showing up its wonderful resources. The plan was generally endorsed and G. W. Wright, T. L. Wallace and J. R. Nell were appointed a committee to meet with the Salem Board to-morrow evening to further consider the matter.

The annual meeting of the Albany Board of Trade will be held to-night, when the election of officers will occur.

NOTICE to all mechanics in the building trades, keep away from Portland, all trades are out on a strike and none here now than is needed to do the work; no chance for employment, by order of U. B. T. League.

The above notice was posted around Albany Saturday, and is the outcome of the strike. Being on a strike of course the union men want to keep non union men away from Portland, which explains the situation. But Albany carpenters are all busy and will probably not interfere.

The assessment of Eugene school district has been equalized. The net taxable property is \$1,278,224. This is an increase of over \$200,000 on last year's assessment.—Guard.

This is about half a million less than the assessment of Albany, a fact we mention simply on account of the Eugene papers occasionally comparing that city to Albany.
