"ADVERSARY HAD WRITTEN A BOOK."

"Behold! my desire is that mine adversary had written a book." Such was Job's remarkable saying when protesting that, notwithstanding the afflictions visited upon him, he had never betrayed his personal integrity. Governor Pennoyer is more fortunate than Job in this, that his "adversary" has written a book in the shape of a letter and had it published in the *Oregonian*. And such a letter! It is about the kind of a letter that the governor would have dictated had he been permitted to write the letter for David. Referring to the charge made by the governor in his Lebanon speech that Thompson, while mayor of Portland, signed an ordinance by which the wharf line in front of the "Stark Block," owned by Thompson, was extended 40 feet into the river, thus making David the owner of that 40 feet, now worth \$100,000, David, in his letter, says: "I never owned that block; I owned less than one-third of it, and Governor Pennoyer is well aware of the fact that the mayor of the city does not establish wharf lines, and this is the first time the matter has ever been called in question, although establishing the wharf line, according to the statement of the governor, occurred eleven years ago."

What a denial! Does David deny signing the ordinance? Not at all. What does he deny? Simply that he did not own all the block, but about one-third of it. He says the mayor does not establish wharf lines. But he was charged with approving an ordinance that *did* establish this new line, and this he does not deny, nor does he dare deny it. The governor's charge is substantially admitted.

Replying to the charge that in 1870 he voted against a proposition to abrogate the Burlingame treaty under which Chinese were allowed to come to the United States and enjoy all the privileges and immunities of the most favored nations Thompson says:

"Governor Pennoyer refers to a vote on a resolution introduced in the state senate in 1870, asking the general government to abrogate the Burlingame treaty with China. I have not the record of the statement with me and do not know what the vote was."

But the people have not been so forgetful of the record you made upon the subject of Chinese immigration, Mr Thompson. They remember it well and for your information we will say that your vote in favor of the Chinese is found at page 426 Senate Journal 1870. Referring to the charge that money was used in electing delegates to the state republican convention, Thompson says:

"His statement that I was nominated by a convention selected by the use of money, is equally untrue."

It is notorious, as known by all men in the state, who observe political matters, that money was used lavishly and openly to buy votes in Portland at the republican primaries. The *Oregonian*, after the convention, openly asserted that money was used by both the Lotan and Jos. Simon factions, and that the corruption was the most open and outrageous on the part of Jim Lotan, who was working in the interest of Thompson, and who succeeded in electing 35 delegates, every one of whom voted for him in the state convention. Thompson is the first man that has had the effrontery to deny the use of money at the Portland primaries.

Speaking of the Portland Bull Run water bill Thompson says:

"I voted for the Portland water bill. All my constituents, democrats and republicans, favored it. I was their representative. I voted to pass the bill with the non-assessable clause, and without it."

On this subject David is candid so far as it goes. If he were elected governor and another water bill should be passed with the non-assessable bond clause in it he would cheerfully approve it, but Governor Pennoyer would veto it. There is no question that the bill will be introduced. This is the issue clearly and sharply defined. The people of Oregon want to see Portland secure good water, but they want it done at the expense of Portland, and not at the expense of the people of the state.

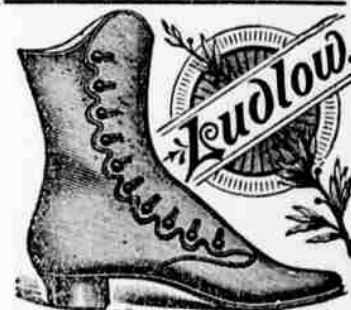
