BOARD OF TRADE.—A good sized and enthusiastic meeting of the Board of Trade was held at the council chambers at evening. The prevailing sentiment was one of push and earnest zeal for Albany in preference to other cities. J. R. Bell, G. W. Wright and T. L. Wallace, the committee on valley advertising reported a general sentiment in favor of a united effort. Albany will be expected to contribute \$200 a month to the enterprise. The committee went to Salem this noon to confer with a Salem committee, and will report at a special meeting Thursday evening.

LINN COUNTY STATISTICS.

As Prepared for the U. S. Bureau of Statistics.

In response to a request from T. S. Lang, representing the U. S. Bureau of Statistics, the committee on statistics of the Albany Board of Trade have furnished the following answers to the questions given, which will prove of interest to the public generally, and be of use to send to inquirers from the east.

In what county are you situated, and date of its early settlement? Linn county; settled in 1845-7.

About how much is timber land? Two-thirds.

About how much open land; is it level rolling or mountainous? One-third; mainly level; foot hills rolling.

Character of soil; depth to and character of subsoil? A black loam; average 18 inches to subsoil which is of clay formation.

Are there evidences of volcanic action in its nature? None.

Are there evidences of coal deposit? Yes.

Mineral deposits worthy of attention? Gold, silver, copper, zinc, iron.

General geological formation? It is hard to describe, but is supposed to be the same as in the Cascade mountains.

What water resources, ponds, lakes, rivers, creeks, etc., rainfall in inches per annum, water power, how great and on what river? Willamette river, Santiam river and several smaller streams and canal furnishing water power to Albany; average 50 inches rainfall per annum.

Is open land arable, suitable for farming or only for grazing? Yes; foot hills for grazing.

Kind and quality of timber or forests and is it largely cut and manufactured, and where marketed? Fir, cedar, ash, pine, maple, alder and oak abound, all of excellent quality; it is largely cut and manufactured, mainly for home consumption.

Products of soil, where marketed, and general pecuniary success? Wheat 25 bushels, oats 70 bushels, barley 60 bushels, potatoes 500 bushels, to acre; hops 1500 to 2000 pounds, bay 2 to 5 tons; all kinds of fruits are grown; grains mainly exported, other articles for home consumption.

Productions of horses, cattle, sheep, wool, etc., and general capabilities for success therein and where marketed? Good horses, cattle, sheep and swine abound and are raised with good success; animals do not require more than two months feeding during the winter months.

Usual number of weeks of winter, spring, summer and autumn weather, and the relative position of each in the twelve months of the year? March to June spring, July to October summer, October to November autumn, December to March winter.

Method of transportation when first settled? Ox teams and Indian canoes.

Present method of transportation, whether by railroads, canals, steamers, and what their titles are, their termini, what cities, towns or portions of your region they accommodate, price of freight per ton per mile and of passenger rates per mile for through or way passage, or other matter of public interest? By rail and boats, the O. R. & N. Co., O. D. Co. and U. P. boats, O. P. R. Co., S. P. R. Co. and Oregonian R. W. Co.; freight and passenger rates about 4c per mile.

Public institutions, Court House, Colleges, school houses, churches and the different creeds, location all and any matters of interest in addition? Court House at Albany, 3 Colleges, 120 schools, 50 churches representing all creeds scattered over the whole county.

Manufactures of all kinds, capital invested, when established, success, etc? Flouring mills, woolen mills, saw and door factories, planing mills, saw mills, etc.; upwards of one million dollars capital directly invested in manufacturing enterprises in the county.

Opportunities for manufacturing with natural resources and all points of interest in this line? Albany and Waterloo, on Thomas Creek, have unlimited power, which is fully utilized.

Any, all points of interest in your production of wheat, corn, barley, rye, oats, hay, hemp, flax, potatoes, butter and cheese; your stirring capabilities therefore and ability to sustain and employ a large population? Two million bushels wheat, one million bushels oats, one hundred thousand bushels barley raised last year; no statistics as to other products of soil.

Production of live stock, introduction of new and improved breeds, and by whom and when? 10,000 head horses, 15,000 cattle, 40,000 sheep, 12,000 swine; new and improved breeds are being introduced and developed.

Taxes, mills per dollar? County, 15c@17 mills average; school and city and road taxes additional 5c@10 mills; assessment 1889 about seven millions net.

General price of labor per day and per month, and cost of living? Ordinary laborers, \$2 per diem, skilled \$3@35 per diem.

All mining interests, kind, location, extent of operations and extent of deposits? Mountains all around are full of all kinds of minerals, mines are being slowly developed.

Fishing interests and the varieties both of salt water and fresh water fishing; capital invested in deep sea fishing, shoal water salmon or other fishing, catching and preparing? Ordinary fish for sporting purposes are found in the mountain streams, no capital invested in catching or preparing fish for market. The German carp provided by the U. S. Gov. do not thrive well here.

BIG FIRE AT SCIO.

\$47,399 Worth of Property Destroyed.

SCIO, Or., May 20.—This morning about 2 o'clock fire broke out in the rear of S. M. Townsend's store, destroying everything and spreading to the adjoining buildings. The following were the losses: Mrs. Smith, millinery, \$2000; S. M. Townsend, grocery store, \$3000; Maltby & Carey, harness shop, \$1500; Albert Shelton, saloon, \$1000; W. H. Blyen, building, \$1000; S. M. Daniel, building, \$750; Talcott estate, \$750; Damage to stock, Johnson, Hibler & Co., \$5000; E. Golins, building, \$500; Gill and Smith, \$1000; Louis Mayer, \$800. Total insurance, \$5000. It was not known what the cause of the fire was.

The County Canvassers.

The county canvass opened yesterday at Lyons. The democrats on the legislative ticket were represented by Hon. J. K. Weatherford, C. L. Shedd and Jeff Myers; the republicans by Peter Hume and Mr. Templeton; the union party by Mr. Parker and Mr. Bryant. Jeff Myers explained his opposition to the wagon road bill of the last legislature, as well as the Portland water bill. Mr. Weatherford explained why he opposed the Bull Run water bill and explained his views on the tariff. Shedd said the McKinley bill increased the duty on jute sacks thus increasing the burdens of those who raise wheat. Mr. Bryant and Mr. Parker said that the other parties had taken up the best part of their platform. Mr. Shedd was in favor of legislation that would be for the general public welfare. The superior fitness of the democratic candidates for the legislature over the other two parties was apparent to all, and it was a matter of common remark that they made votes by their speeches.

R. A. Michener, republican, and Prof. G. F. Russell talked on school matters. Mr. Russell is an old inhabitant while his opponent is a new-comer and unknown to the people and not identified with the affairs of Linn county. Mr. Russell holds a very high grade first-class certificate and is a first-class experienced teacher. Mr. Pearl, republican candidate for sheriff, made a brief talk and closed with a song. The democrats made a most favorable impression.

The first of the week Wm. Templeton arrived from Albany, having crossed the Cascade mountains by the tantan route on horseback. He reported snow from Cache creek to Snow creek varying in depth from one foot to twenty feet. —Review.
