AS NEAR AS IT CAN GET.

The Herald is evidently weakening on its proposition that the duty on jute sacks as provided for in the McKinley bill is the same rate of duty as now exists. This we showed to be utterly fallacious, and the young limb of the law who has been hired to write "editorials" for that paper during the campaign sees it. The trouble with the young man is that he has not yet learned the difference between a specific duty and an ad valorem duty. For his information we will explain. A specific duty is one computed on the yard, number of articles imported, size, weight etc, without regard to quality or value. An ad valorem duty is one placed upon the cost of the article imported without regard to size, weight, number, quality or quantity and is always an unvarying per cent of the cost. The present duty on jute sacks is an ad valorem duty of 40 per cent of the cost. The McKinley bill, as the Herald alleges, places the duty at two and two-tenths cents per pound. Now then it is impossible for these duties to be the same except when a pound of jute sacks cost just five and a half cents in the foreign market from whence imported, for two and two-tenths is exactly 40 per cent of five and a-half. But sacks which weigh a pound cost from 2½ to 4 cents each. Under the McKinley bill if sacks cost 2½ cents the rate of duty is 55 per cent. When they cost 3 cents the rate of duty is 73½. When they cost 4 cents (and they rarely do) the rate of duty is 55 per cent. The young man who writes the "editorials" in the Herald makes a very good lawyer but a very poor editor.

E B McElroy has been superintendent of public instruction for two terms of four years each—eight years in all. In that time he has "worked" the legislatures and the taxpayers very successfully—for McElroy. Is it not a little too much for him to ask now for a third term—and more and more perquisites, picking, and pilferings? This is not, or ought not to be, a political office, and we are sure that it is for the best interest of the taxpayers and the school children of the state to give Mr McElroy a rest. He has been very industrious—in certain ways—and must be tired. He is also now "well fixed," and his opponent is a poor, competent and deserving man. Under all these circumstances we ask republicans to cast their ballots for Mr Leroy, and not for McElroy.—East Oregonian.

In their desperate effort to defeat Governor Penoyer, the Oregonian and other organs are insinuating some vague charges against him with reference to his disposal of school lands by the board, of which he is a member, as is also Mr McBride, republican secretary of state. We need not anticipate the governor's answer to this slander. It will be made complete and conclusive. They are careful to not do more than make misty insinuations, but even these will be repelled and dissolved as soon as the governor has seen or heard of them.—East Oregonian.

The Oregonian published a dispatch from Roseburg giving an account of the enthusiastic outpouring of the people at that place to hear Penoyer and Webb. It put the following heading to the dispatch in order to break the force of the rapidly increasing popularity of these two worthy public servants:

"In A Democratic Stronghold."
Now the truth is that Roseburg and Douglas are also republican strongholds. But that is the way of that paper.
