PENNOYER VS THOMPSON.

The following is taken from the *Pacific Express*, the organ of the Union Labor party in Oregon. It is published at Portland, the home of Thompson:

While refraining from any active part in the contest for governor, we are at liberty to say how intensely opposite we feel to the elevation of such an impersonation of the money power as D P Thompson.

Gov. Pennoyer in his canvass is making damaging charges as to the public actions of Thompson. While not vouching for their accuracy we are disposed to consider them serious enough for consideration and to believe unless refuted.

One of these pertains to an act by the city of Portland signed by Thompson as mayor, by which the wharf line for a short distance extended 40 feet toward the channel of the river, to the detriment of navigation. This gave to the property known as the Starr block an addition of 40 by 200 feet, or an added value at present of \$100,000 at least. But the Starr block belonged to Thompson.

Another relates how as administrator of the Holiday estate Thompson drew a fee of \$500 per month; and in addition sought to draw \$250 more per month as president of the saw mill company of which he was stopped only by the supreme court from giving mortgages upon the property in his custody.

Further the governor says that as the locks at Oregon City may be purchased by the state in 1892, at their actual value, or the \$200,000 furnished for them out of the school land funds of the state, he returned to the school fund, it is very dubious to put the interest of the state in this matter in the hands of Thompson, Eastman of Oregon City, and Morley of Multnomah county, respectively as governor of the state, and members of the legislature (as in case of their election) since these three men are all owners of stock in the electric

light company which also owns a controlling interest in the locks. As the locks company has never paid a cent of the 10 per cent net profit per year which was to be turned over to the state treasury, Pennoyer thinks the locks must be a property of very low value when making no profits—and that the state might rightfully convert them to public use for the benefit of the people of the valley.

In our opinion Thompson is narrow, grasping and self-seeking, and charges that he is unscrupulous as far as the law allows we may easily set to his credit.—*Pacific Express*.
