THE DOUBLE A.—The chief engineer of the Albany and Astoria railroad came down yesterday morning with a full surveying party and more accountants than have been seen in these parts for a long time. The party is seventeen in number: W. W. Barr, chief engineer; J. J. McCausland, transitman; Burr Power, head chainman; Richard Abbey, Chas. Redfield, A. Cannon, Harry Barr, F. Powers, Chas. Walden, Wm. Gilson, Henry Green and six others. Pack cases, provisions, instruments, supplies of all descriptions went down with the party to New Astoria last evening where the survey on this end will begin. The route will be surveyed to Tillamook. The line from Albany to Tillamook has already been surveyed. Engineer Barr is an experienced man, and has a splendidly fitted out party. He expects to be able to furnish notes of his surveys in a short time.—Astorian.

Wolverson, the sweethearts, Mrs. Althouse and Mrs. Clark as the twins, attracted considerable attention causing great merriment. After a lively noon hour school was taken up. The committeemen, S. S. Train, Jas. Danals and J. K. Elderkin, entered, and committeeman Train made a five speech, bringing the master decidedly to time for teaching new fangled notions. Mrs. Honeyuckle, Mrs. F. M. Redlich, entered and read her poem, doing a fine piece of acting. Clara Ellen Wolverson read the address of welcome in fine shape. Then the exhibition began. David Patrick Mason declaimed with marked ability about the boy on the burning deck. Janey May Elderkin's composition was well presented. Then George Simpson, the Baby Brother, in a clear distinct voice, declaimed about "you'd scarce expect one of my age," in a manner that brought much applause.
