STOCK IN TRADE, BLUFF AND COIN.

PORTLAND, May 24, 1899.

Editors Democrat:

One word in reference to Thompson's political stock as given by himself. His speeches are bold and unblushing admissions of his peculiar methods of hogging everything through. He tells his hearers that he was working for Multnomah county when he voted to exempt water bonds from taxation. That is, he was working against the interest of the state for Multnomah. A hard shell republican here remarked on reading this blatant excuse of Thompson, "yes and he is a fool enough to repeat this death blow to him all over the state. 'For said he' when Thompson took the oath as a legislator to support the constitution, he swore he would tax all property required to be taxed by that constitution. His oath made him as much an officer of one county as another, for he was a legislator for the whole state controlled by the constitution." If Thompson could, under this oath, exempt any property in Multnomah county from taxation, he could exempt all of it. This requires the representative to discharge this public duty impartially and to the best of his ability. Mr Thompson had the ability to disregard the constitution and his oath under the plea that he was pleasing somebody in Multnomah county, when the fact was, no doubt, that he wanted to bid on the water bonds when offered for sale to the best of his ability." He takes pains to place himself beyond the case of a person who might vote to exempt bonds from taxation on a claim of conscience; but Thompson claims nothing of the kind. All the way through his methods are the same. Beating the "damn little Jew," as he is credited with saying when he ran for mayor, and feeling the same at the primaries this spring, and dodging the constitution, all were from a desire to please "Multnomah county."

The next great argument he makes is he was a blacksmith. He must have been a miserable one or it would have been known before he was nominated for governor. He says he found something better and got out of the business. There have been and are still very talented and honorable men in the blacksmith business as in all other occupations. But Thompson has not passed as such. In this line of blacksmiths he has been very obscure. We will leave it to this body of mechanics to say, if Thompson to day was shorn of his wealth, whether they would nominate him for governor. If he was the "poor blacksmith of Oregon City," no blacksmith, nor the republican convention would touch him as a candidate for governor. Even the astute Jim Lotan would not know Thompson, if he did he would not speak to him. Simply because there is nothing to recommend Thompson but gold and coin. These are facts that will not be gainsayed by those who know them. There is nothing left now but to bluff Thompson through. This is the transparent card of Jim Lotan. Look out for great predictions of victories all over the state when in fact there is scarcely a reliable republican in this city who looks for a republican victory in Oregon. You will read it in the dispatches how few attend democratic meetings and how weak the processions are, when, in fact, the democratic candidates have had a perfect ovation wherever they have spoken and are getting away with their cause with the promise of the greatest democratic victory that this state has ever given. There is state pride enough left to prevent a man from being governor who is totally unfitted for the place. The plan is to make Thompson senator if elected with a republican legislature. This is his last chance and it is desperate. The end justifies the means, and his credited remark that he will spend \$100,000 to be elected is not strange. How Lotan loves him for this. Democrats look out and defeat all such criminals methods.

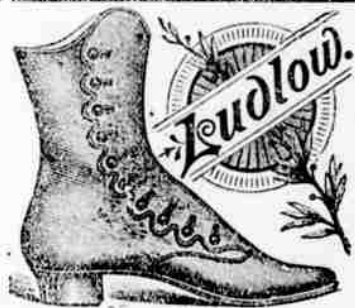
