ONE OF D P'S TRICKS.

J H Rathbun, a strong republican at Portland, tells his experience with Dave Thompson as follows:

Eighteen years ago I purchased 710 acres of land six miles east of East Port-land. I was to pay \$12,500 for the prop-erty, paid \$2500 down, and gave a mortgage for the balance. When I bought the land it was cheap at the price, but hard times came, values decreased and I found my-self unable to pay the mortgage when due. The company holding the claim against the property being about to retire from business, and I not being in a position to meet the demands upon me, the land was sold on a foreclosure of the mortgage. During the pendency of the sale I ar-ranged with Thompson to bid the land in. He did not do the bidding himself, but W B Gilbert, United States commissioner, did it for him. "This was seven years ago, and Thompson, by agreement, leased the land to me for a period of three years, at a rental equal to the interest on the amount for which the land was bid in for him. "Shortly after this I had to borrow another \$5000, to meet a debt I owed to S D Smith. I again approached Thompson for this loan, but he said he did not have the money to spare, but the Portland Sav-ing bank, of which he was president, had some funds to loan, and that I could secure the accommodation from it. This I did, giving my note for the \$5000. Shortly afterward Mr Thompson suggested that I should organize a company, to which I should transfer my interest in the land, and that the company should assume the indebtedness, including the \$5000 borrowed to pay Smith. I acquiesced in this sug-gestion, organized the Clarno Land & Im-provement company, and was elected its president. "Well, shortly afterward Thompson informed me that he had secured a purchaser for the land, and desired me to part with my new interest in it—that is, the interest I had in the Clarno Land & Improvement company. I expressed a willingness to do so, but when I ascer-tained that, according to Thompson's fig-ures, I was to receive but about \$4000 I promptly declined to accept the price. "Finding that I was determined not to be swindled in this way, the millionaire bank-er threatened and did sue me on the \$5000 note which had already been settled in the trade and deal with the Clarno Co. The case went to the supreme court and here the court set down on Thompson, the money grasper and I beat him, the court not allowing him to collect the note twice. Seeing that he can not collect the note in this state he has assigned the note to a man in Tacoma, so that a suit can be brought in the United States court and this has been done and the case is now pending before Deady. "And now, while I am a republican, I do not ask my fellow members of the party to take that fact in-to consideration when I appeal to them to oppose D P Thompson in this gubernat-orial election. I simply beg of them as honest men and good citizens to judge for themselves as to this man's qualifications for the high office of governor of this state.

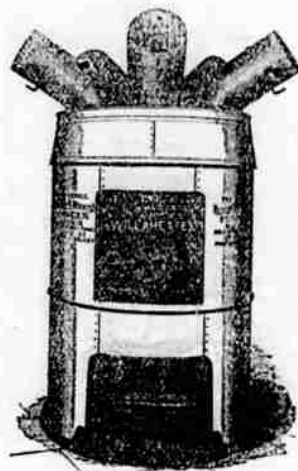
