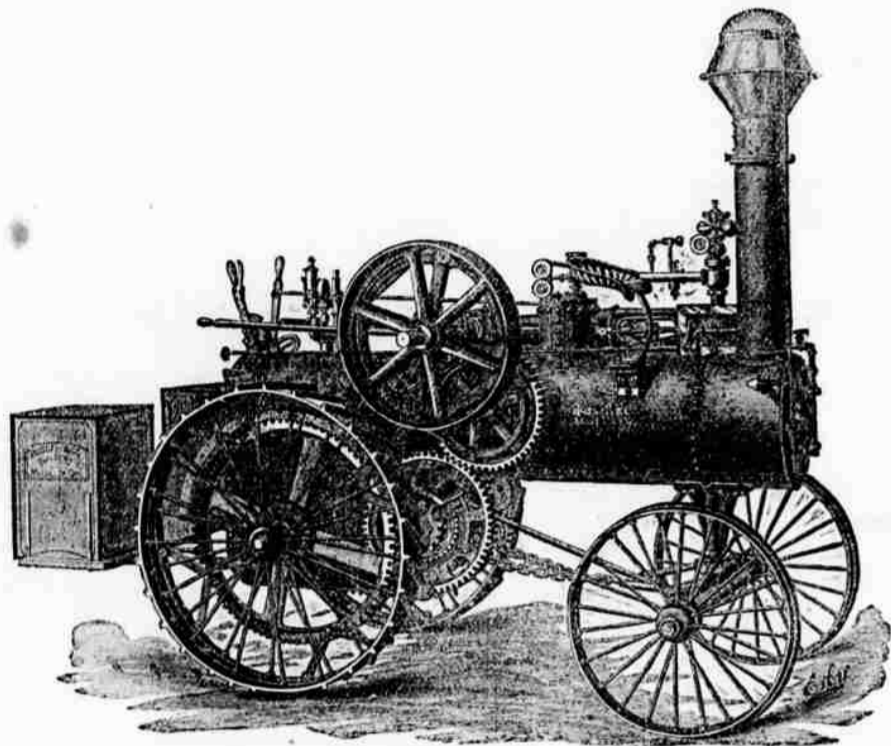

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

River and Harbor Bill.

WASHINGTON, May 27.—All the items put in the river and harbor bill by Mr. Hemenway for Oregon, went through to-day without a break or suggestion of amendment. The appropriations were large and there were a number of them, but no opposition was developed. It now only remains for the Oregon senators to see that no cut is made in the senate, and Mr. Dolph's position on the commerce committee will enable him to keep in the bill beyond doubt. Few states have fared as well as Oregon, and compared to population, Oregon is far ahead of all others in the bill. The river and harbor bill will probably pass the house to-morrow.

Some Census Returns.

WASHINGTON, May 27.—The census office to-day made public the first results of the eleventh census in relation to state and local finance. It consists of the preliminary report of the indebtedness of 2809 counties in the United States. Reports show the principal of state debts at the present time, \$228,679,917, of this \$194,954,206 is bonded, and \$33,725,610 floating. This shows a net decrease in the total debt during the last ten years of \$54,459,484 bonded debt, having been increased by \$59,623,764, and floating debt increased by \$9,623,764.

The U. P.

PORTLAND, May 27.—The Union Pacific will begin immediately the construction of its branch line to Puget Sound. It will run via Vancouver, Olympia and Tacoma to Seattle. All is now ready with the exception of a few minor details for terminal facilities at Seattle. Work will be pushed to a completion as fast as men and money will do it.

Tacoma, May 27.—

Much excitement has been created here by the private information from Washington becoming public that the senate had rejected Port Orchard as the site for the navy yard, and a point beyond the narrow near Tacoma selected instead. This site can easily be fortified so that the entrance by an enemy's vessel would be utterly impossible, and is the most practicable and secluded point on the sound.

California Floods.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 27.—A Chronicle Fresno says: The San Joaquin and King rivers are higher than ever before. About Elkhorn many thousands of acres are inundated. A large area near Reedley is also flooded. Several hundred acres of the finest wheat land of the Laguna de Tache grant are under water, and what promised to be a splendid yield of the acre will not pay for the harvesting. Below Hamptonville the San Joaquin has broken its banks and hundreds of acres are covered with water.
